For the safety of our Town residents AND BECAUSE IT'S THE LAW...ALL DOGS MUST BE LICENSED. You can license your spay or neutered dog for \$8 per year or your un-spay or unneutered dog for \$20 per year for up to 3 years as long as their rabies is valid. If you have any problems with dogs in your area please reach out to our dog control officers: Ken Johnson @ 315-263-1000 or Laura Holt @ 315-696-6468.

PLEASE REMEMBER NYS Public Health Laws require that all puppies and kittens get their 1st rabies shot at the age of 3 months, and a booster shot at one year old and then again, every 3 years. There still are no rabies clinics posted but on the Dept. of Health website they are listing a Drive thru clinic. People may register on line (similar to signing up for a COVID Vaccine).



From the LaFayette Public Library



Using the library: we have gotten rid of appointments. Therefore, you can drop anytime during library hours to browse, pick up items, computer use and all the rest of the services available at the library, such as faxing, printing, copying, etc. We prefer the wearing of masks inside the building, until such time that the comfort level is such that there is no concern. Our hours are:

Mon & Tues	10:00 am—7:00 pm
Wednesday	10:00 am—5:00 pm
Thursday	12:00 pm—7:00 pm
Friday	10:00 am—5:00 pm
Saturday	10:00 am—2:00 pm

Please note: all services except for checkout end 15 minutes before closing. That includes all of the services mentioned above

Returning items: We will continue to leave the outside book drop unlocked so you do not have to come into the library to return items. Our inside book drop is also available during our open hours. Also, we are no longer quarantining items, so they will be checked back in upon return. We thank you for your patience during that confusing time when we were quarantining items. Hopefully, that is over!

NEW ITEM reminder: We have recently purchased 30 "Wonderbooks" (with more to come) for the children's area. They are combination of print and audiobook in one. The audio component is built right into the physical book. So you can read it like a normal print book with illustrations with your child, or have the book narrated while you follow along. They are shelved with the Easy Readers.

Don't have access to the internet at home? Reminding you that we now circulate 7 Chrome Books with a Verizon hotspot. They go out for 3 weeks. You can place holds, but no renewals. You do that by placing a hold on "OCPL tech pack" They must be returned to the lending library and need to be checked in at the circulation desk. It must be verified that all parts are returned before the kit can be returned. Come take advantage of this. This is the courtesy of our county legislators (County Legislature Chair Dave Knapp and County Executive Ryan McMahon in particular). Please thank them if you get a chance!

We have renewed our three Empire passes that allow access to any of the New York State parks, and two passes to the Onondaga county parks. For the county passes, please call the facility you plan to visit beforehand to make sure they are accepting the passes at this time (for example, right now the zoo is *not* accepting the passes for financial reasons). The Empire passes and the Onondaga County park passes can be checked out for a three day loan

period, only one per family at a time and no holds or renewals. These passes are good throughout the year. Enjoy!

Coach Jerry Kelly has retired as a full-time member of the LaFayette School District after twenty-eight years of dedicated hard-work on behalf of the hundreds of students that have grown up as Lancers!

Coach Kelly came to LaFayette from the West Side of Syracuse, NY and attended West Side Catholic High School formerly the Syracuse Parochial League.

Over the past 28 years (3 years of part-time employment) Coach Kelly has been a Teachers Assistant along with leading the LCS Athletic Department as the Athletic Coordinator. He has coached Boys Baseball for 23 years, Boys Basketball (will be entering his 20th season), Girls Softball for 5 years, and short stints at the Junior Varsity and Modified level. His programs have earned a League Title in Girls Softball, Two Sectional Titles and a League Title in Boys Basketball while accumulating 212 wins and 180 losses at the helm of the basketball program.

What brought you to LaFayette Coach? "After Mary Jo and I were married, we lived on the West Side and my Father-in-law (Bernie Aungier) convinced us to move out here. Stop renting and put your money on a house were Bernie's words!" So, we moved and along the way our five children – Katie, Heather, Kristie, Jeremiah, and Sean were able to grow up here in LaFayette near their grandparents".

How did you get involved with LCS and when? "I had been working for William Importing in Liverpool and former LCC President Jerry Smith asked if I would get involved in their programs, so I became a volunteer coach and started in T-Ball softball and baseball". "Along the way I became

Spoor Cemetery

Located in our town is a small burial ground known as Spoor Cemetery. It has that name as the only tombstone there is that of John Spoor.

The burial ground was first reserved in a deed from David and Cornelia Campbell dated March 2, 1816 to John Spoor for 19 acres "excepting and reserving therefore two rods square (One rod equals 5 &1/2 yards) where Sylvester S. Campbell was buried. Sylvester was David and Cornelia's young son who died between 1810 and 1816. There is no stone on his grave.

John Spoor was a Revolutionary War veteran. He enlisted in 1776 when he was 26 years old in Col. Gansevoort's N. Y. regiment and served four years as ensign. In 1790 he was in Vermont. When he was 66 years old he bought his 19 acres of land in LaFayette from David and Cornelia Campbell.

On March 3, 1821 John Spoor applied for a pension, being then 71 years old. He said he owned "nineteen acres of very poor land in Pompey (It was not yet LaFayette until 1825) worth not over \$5 per acre. There is some very poor land there yet." He had other property, all amounting to \$265.81, and in this was a pair of "old andirons (a pair of metal supports for logs in a fireplace) with the feet off." His credit was so good that he owed \$200. His wife Rachel at the time of the application was 69 years old and their daughter Polly lived with them.

John Spoor lived another 13 years and died July 1, 1834 being 84 years old. He was buried next to Sylvester Campbell. After his death the 19 acres was assessed to "Widow Rachel Spoor" in 1835. It then passed to their daughter Polly on February 20,1837. Polly then sold the 19 acres to Edmund Hall who had 86 acres of his own. Rachel Spoor died in LaFayette on June 16,1843. It is not known where she is buried nor is it known what happened to Polly.

The next mention of the burial ground is on July 14, 1851 when Edmund Hall sold all of his farm to his son Nelson "except the burying ground where John Spoor is buried."

In 1924 the cemetery was conveyed to the Empire State Society Sons of the Revolution and on October 25th a dedication ceremony was held. An iron gate was erected along with a flagpole. A memorial monument was also placed there in honor of Jeremiah Jackson though it was later proved he was never buried there. In 1928 the Syracuse Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution marked John Spoor's stone with a bronze medal.

Over the years Spoor Cemetery has come to be classified as an "abandoned cemetery." That term should never be equated to a "neglected cemetery" but that is what has happened since a photo was taken in 1978 and put in Roy Dodge's 1979 book "Crossroads Town" on page 151. The photo shows the cemetery in the midst of a plowed field with no trees anywhere. On a visit to the cemetery a couple of months ago there was a good size tree growing right next to the tombstone and brush almost completely covering everything else. That is what 40 plus years of neglect will do. Thankfully, through the initiative of Roy Dodge and the resolve of the town board the tree has been chopped down and the brush has been cleared. What needs to be done now is to visit the cemetery a couple of times a year to see that things are as they should be.

It is not hard to understand how the cemetery came to be neglected. Like most of you, I




was unaware of the cemetery's existence. But, having participated in this cleanup project I realize that I can and should do more. In fact, all of us can do more to honor our veterans, past and present. We have special holidays set aside to do just that but don't leave it to just those special occasions. Use every day to honor in some way those who have fought to make our nation the great nation that it is. Our veterans deserve that and so does John Spoor.



Our process begins with brainstorming and developing ideas, which we are currently doing. 
