I am happy to report to you that your Town Board boldly moved forward at the September 14th town meeting to tender two purchase offers to buy the former LaFayette Hotel and the adjacent vacant property on the south side of the building. The goal is restoring the southeast corner of our "*Crossroads Town*" as an attractive and commercially active area of the Hamlet.

The Code of the Town of LaFayette Zoning defines our "Hamlet District as: to provide for the development of high-density, compact, pedestrian-oriented shopping, service, entertainment and residential districts. It's designed to encourage development in the hamlet core of the community. This district is designed to protect the small community charm by encouraging within the Hamlet architecturally appropriate standards typical of the Town's early development history. These areas may need rehabilitation or redevelopment".

This area of the Hamlet has been under duress since the year 2000 and has undergone numerous attempts to redesign and place a purpose to the properties. However, the ability to restore this building to its original purpose for public housing have failed due to the lack of an acceptable waste treatment plant.

The Town Board has worked for months to develop a strategy and vision for these two properties:

Our strategy: the properties were purchased with federal funds that became available through the America Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Thus, no local taxpayer monies were used for these two purchases. The strategy is to hopefully receive a grant in the amount of \$500,000 from Onondaga County to apply to the restoration and the rehabilitation of the LaFayette Hotel parcel.

Our vision: is to work within the Town Code that is stated above while also remaining within the tradition of the historical section: one of the anchors of our *"Four-Corners"*.

I often receive an email from a resident who returns home from work around 11 PM each night and stops at the red light while facing south on Route 11: his message to me has always been, "why do I have to look at this eye-sore and can't we do better". Yes, we can, has always been the answer in my heart and now our time has come.

From the Town Supervisor cont'd....

Since March of this year a Tiger Team has worked with our consultant Barton & Loguidice utilizing a grant that has focused on the Hamlet Revitalization and an update to our Comprehensive Plan. Our survey results reflect two demands from the public:

- ⇒ "Clean up the Cross Roads of New York"
- ⇒ "I can't believe the hamlet doesn't have water and sewer. Needs to happen"


Our original concept for these two properties is to remain within the design standard of the Hamlet and our Code while offering up these possibilities for this corner: a building for a visitors site, open space and a small event center for community activities, business incubator office space, and the rebuilding of the brick building in the current vacant space that once stood there. The first rendition that was presented at the Town Board meeting reflect the period design taken from the historical books authored by Historian Emeritus Roy Dodge. There will be time for public input at each step of this project.

While working the restoration of the "corner", we have also been studying the possibility of creating a Town / Hamlet water district that would draw water from our own Town wells, treat it, and provide it to our businesses in the Hamlet area and offering to residents as well.....more to come on this.

Let's work together in unity in our effort to bring the Cross Roads of New York back to a point of Pride as we approach our 200th Birthday Celebration in 2025!



We hope everyone has had a pleasant summer. What a strange trip it's been! We started the summer lifting the mask mandate for people coming into the building that have been vaccinated. However, due to the uptick in Covid cases, we ask that masks be worn in the building, use hand sanitizer at the entrance, whatever your vaccination status. That goes for anyone over 2 yrs. of age. If there is a drop in cases, we will reconsider. Thank you for your cooperation in keeping us all healthy!

Returning items: The outside book drop is open 24/7, so you can use that anytime. The book drop inside is also available during library open hours. **We are no longer quarantining items**. Items will be checked in as they are returned to the library, instead of waiting 3-7 days.

Picking up items, browsing and computer use: in late Spring, we eliminated scheduling visits to the library and for computer use. Even though we are asking people to wear masks inside the building, we are **not** bringing back scheduled visits. Eagle Scout Scott Heath—Leadership in Action!

The Town of LaFayette is truly blessed to have a young man like Scott Heath in our Community ... young and mature beyond his peers - a proven Leader!



Scott lives in the Cascade Road – Clark Hollow Road area and took inspiration from his neighborhood to lead an overwhelming effort to literally bring respect and righteousness back to "Sherman Hollow" cemetery.

His family includes Scott (Dad), Kelly (Mom), and his siblings Samuel and Leah. Bud and Carol Nurse – long time dairy people and motorcycle driver- are Scott's grandparents. Scott has lived in LaFayette since he was just over four years old.

Scott joined Troop 115 of the Fabius Boy Scouts while he was in sixth grade and his journey continues as a Senior at LCS while he works towards his Eagle Scout rating. He chose a local project that would test his will, motivation, and ability to improvise. The Sherman Hollow Cemetery (1.0 Mile south from Route 20 on Jamesville-Apulia Road) is a NYS declared "abandoned" cemetery thus it counts on volunteers to maintain it along with a limited amount of support provided by the Town.

Over the course of a year, Scott, his family, and his volunteers have transformed Sherman Hollow Cemetery back into a state of wellness that now reflects the history and respect that can be gleaned from each head-stone of our first settlers.

Their work included: cutting brush and debris that were hauled away on five 10-wheel dump trucks, raising money to invest in a new flagpole, concrete to shore up leaning or fallen head-stones, enlisting the help from a small army of volunteers: "My Dad was a big help and my grandfather, Bud Nurse, donated the fence post, skid steer, and concrete materials".

Biggest challenge: the planning! And, then the execution of the plan, of which LaFayette Historian Rick Stout assisted with. Completing a one-year project in less than 60 days while rising to the challenges of school, limited volunteers, and the size of the project!

My mentors: "Ed Drexler and Ray Carr from Troop 115"! "Troop Leader Barb Scanlon for the inspiration during my journey and her donation for the flagpole"!

Lessons learned: "Learned how to control chaos "I "Sharpened my leadership skills and learned how to place the strengths of our volunteers in the right spot to succeed".

Scott will graduate from LCS in 2022 and then hopes to attend the Merchant Marine Academy with the goal of becoming a mid-shipman and then onto US Coast Guard to "serve My Country" "I then hope to become a Captain of a merchant vessel sailing the high seas of the world".

LaFayette truly has a "Diamond in the Rough" when looking at who Scott Heath is and what he can do. Please join him on Saturday, October 16th, 10 AM, at the Sherman Hollow Cemetery for its re-dedication and to celebrate Scott's work!

From Apple Festival Board of Directors

The LaFayette Apple Festival Board of Directors is excited that the Festival is back for its 48th event on October 9th and 10th. Planning is coming together and we are looking forward to a successful return to supporting the local schools, churches, community, and non-profit organizations after having to cancel the 2020 Festival. Please stop down and support these important organizations that enrich our community, or sign up to volunteer as many groups are still in need of assistance.

We would also like to mention the concert series that was held on the Festival grounds this past summer. The Festival is an expensive endeavor, costing in excess of \$200,000 a year to put on, with many of the expenses fixed whether we have good attendance, favorable weather, or have to cancel as in 2020. These expenses include property taxes, insurance, electricity, building, equipment and grounds maintenance, as well as still supporting the community through scholarships and other donations.

Since 2016 we have experienced rain on one or both days of the Festival weekend which has impacted

attendance, and with having to cancel the 2020 event, our financial reserves have been severely depleted. We need to maintain a certain balance in order to be able to host the next year's event. We realized we needed another source of revenue to remain viable to hold the 2021 Apple Festival. A solution seemed to be at hand when we were approached by a local concert promoter and agreed to lease a portion of our grounds to them. The LaFayette



Apple Festival is not in the concert business. We have enjoyed a good relationship with our neighbors in Cardiff and it was never our intention to have this cause a disturbance.

Lastly, we would like to address rumors that seem to be circulating on social media.

- The LaFayette Apple Festival is a 501(c)4 not for profit corporation which purchased the former Field Fruit Farm in 1989. The grounds have been zoned commercial/business since that time. No individual owns the grounds or rights to the LaFayette Apple Festival.
- No member of the Board of Directors, or their families, personally profited financially or otherwise from the concert series. All contractual revenue received from the lease of the property went directly into the Festival account to cover expenses associated with the 2021 Festival.

Since 1973 it has been the goal of the LaFayette Apple Festival to promote our wonderful Town and provide a venue for local groups to raise funds to put back into supporting the residents and our community.

County Legislature Update



I am excited to announce that I have received confirmation that I have been able to secure an additional \$100,000 for the construction of the new Ron Bush Senior Center at Stafford Park. This is in addition to the \$150,000 that was previously announced. I'm excited to continue working with the Town Board through the bidding process and seeing

the project through to completion. This will be a wonderful new facility for residents to utilize for community classes, meetings, events, and family gatherings.



I am also working closely with Town Supervisor, Bill McConnell, and the Town Board, on the transfer of the



Cardiff area public water system to the Onondaga County Water Authority (OCWA). This has been a long process which should be completed in the next few months and will keep the water system viable and serving Central New York's Water Authority residents for years to come. We are also improving the system by adding a

water storage tank to improve reliability of delivery.

From Our Town Historian Rick Stout



Some Notes on the Sherman Hollow Cemetery No deed reserving the burying ground has ever been found for the Sherman Hollow Cemetery situated on Apulia Road south of Route 20.

The belief that it came from the Enoch Everingham Farm, as printed in some accounts, is not correct. Enoch did not purchase the land surrounding the cemetery on three sides until 1830. His father, John Everingham who came here in 1801 or 1802, settled on fifty acres nearby that did not include this site.


According to records in the Town of Otisco the victim of the first accidental death in that town was buried here. Nathaniel Dady Jr. who died July 19, 1802 is said to have been brought here for burial. The grave is unmarked.

There are five Revolutionary War soldiers buried here. Their stones were marked with bronze emblems in 1928 by the Sons of the American Revolution. By the 1960's all of these emblems had been stolen. There are two veterans of the War of 1812 here.

VanRenselear Everingham, who grew up on the adjoining farm and died of illness early in the Civil War, was brought here from Washington, D. C. by his brother. His remains were moved to the LaFayette Rural Cemetery and placed on a large family lot a few years later.

There are 57 marked graves in the cemetery. The earliest stone is that of James Sherman in 1813. He was a revolutionary soldier and the first settler in the valley in 1793. The last stone is that of Darius Hamilton in 1877. The farm upon which he lived for fifty years was on the hillside above the railroad within sight of the ground where he, his wife and four children are buried.

From the LaFayette Rural Cemetery

The operation and maintenance of our cemetery is an ongoing commitment. The cost of opening and closing of graves, pouring cement for headstone foundations, mowing and trimming of grass and general maintenance, all add to the expense most of which are hired services.

The financial income the cemetery receives from lot sales is not nearly enough to cover the cost of operation and maintenance.

The cemetery is a separate entity and receives no financial aid from the Town of LaFayette.
Therefore, the cemetery is responsible for its own cost of operations. There are no contracts.

We do welcome all public donations to help with the ongoing cost. There are no salaried positions on the Board of Trustees.



Frozen food bags Pre-wash salad mix bags

Candy bar wrappers Plastic bags w/food residue or labels

Chip bags Degradable/compostable bags or film packaging

Six pack rings Clamshell containers (berry & takeout containers

Plastic egg cartons Bulky/rigid plastics (buckets, baskets)

Collect & Take to Grocery or Retail Stores

Shopping bags Produce bags (w/labels removed)

Dry Cleaning bags Retail bags (w/drawstring removed)

Bread bags Cereal box liners (that don't tear like paper


Bubble wrap Overwrap (from per towels, toilet paper, napkins etc.

Newspaper bags Case wrap (from bottle water cases)

Zip top bags Air pillows (from packaging, air removed


