6. Communications

A. 2017 Inter Municipal Agreement (IMA) contract this is the contract we participate in with the county that benefits the Library and L.C.C.

B. Surplus of the 1999 International Plow Truck, Supervisor Daniel asked if Superintendent Greeley had a value of the truck and was advised by Attorney Gilligan that it would not be a good idea to publicly discuss the current value of the truck.

C. Morezak Road Abandonment which is a continuation of last months meeting. Supervisor Daniel advised that tonight it will be put up for a Public Hearing and the goal tonight will be to put it up for a "Qualified Abandonment". Attorney Gilligan gave the definition as maintaining the right of way which would benefit anyone who is adjacent to it, it would not be deeded over to any one party or all of those parties it would remain a town right of way but it would be abandoned as a town road. It would not be paved, constructed, maintained, plowed, pot holes would not be filled in. It would just exist for the adjacent property owners to use to get to their properties indefinitely.

Q: Mr. Sheremeta asked if property owners that are using the road can fill the pot holes; clip the brush, etc...

A: Supervisor Daniel advised that the individuals can, but the town will incur no expenses in maintaining the road.

Q: Mr. Sheremeta asked if another land owner can put up a gate or block others from getting through.

A: Attorney Gilligan advised that yes and adjoining landowner can put a fence up but must put a minimum (10) ten foot gate that must be unlocked, it can be latched but not locked and has to be accessible by

landowners. The public hearing will be held at the October 10th town board meeting.

Q: If the Sheremeta's wanted to develop the land into something later on they have access to the lane/qualified abandonment they will need to maintain that part as if it's a driveway kind of?

A: Attorney Gilligan advised that it's up to them if they want to access it they will have to.

Q: Will they plow up to the part where the homes already are?

A: Attorney Gilligan said that it will be plowed up to the turnaround, at end of the paved portion of the road. Superintendent Greely said what they have done in the past they will continue to do, but nothing more.

Supervisor Daniel moved and Councilor Zajac seconded the motion to hold a public hearing on October 10th at the regular town board meeting regarding the qualified abandonment of the unimproved section of Morezak road **Motion carried 4 -0.**

D. Town Infrastructure Funding amount for demolition of Old Highway Garage – Supervisor Daniel advised that per the letter received by the town dated August 27, 2017 the town is to received a grant in the amount of \$35,833 towards the demolition of the old highway garage. Supervisor Daniel advised that the garage should be down by the end of September / beginning of October. He wanted to thank County Legislature David Knapp and former Supervisor Andrew Ohstrom for their work in obtaining these funds. Building Inspector Ralph Lamson advised that they will need to pull a permit for the demo.

E. Proposed Local Law C-2017 Overriding the Tax Levy Limit established in NYS General Municipal Law. Attorney Gilligan advised that he was asked to put together legislation that allows the town board to exceed the 2% tax cap under state law based upon initial discussions and projections because of a number of different expenses the town will be facing there is a possibility that we will be exceeding that cap and if you don't pass the legislation now you can't exceed the cap and you could get in a situation where you couldn't raise the money needed to run the town. So the following legislation facilitates that if needed.

**TOWN OF LAFAYETTE
PROPOSED LOCAL LAW NO. C-2017**

**A Local Law Overriding the Tax Levy Limit Established in the
New York General Municipal Law §3-c in and for the Town of LaFayette**

Be it enacted by the Town of LaFayette Town Board, as follows:

Section 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT

It is the intent of this local law to override the limit on the amount of real property taxes that may be levied by the Town of LaFayette, County of Onondaga pursuant to New York General Municipal Law § 3-c, and to allow the Town of LaFayette to adopt a Town budget for (a) Town purposes; (b) fire protection districts; and (c) any other special or improvement district governed by the Town Board for the fiscal year 2018, that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the “tax levy limit” as defined by the General Municipal Law § 3-c.

Section 2. AUTHORITY

This local law is adopted pursuant to Subdivision 5 of the New York General Municipal Law, § 3-c, which expressly authorizes the Town Board to override the tax levy limit by the adoption of a local law approved by a vote of sixty percent (60%) of the Town Board.

Section 3. TAX LEVY LIMIT OVERRIDE

The Town Board of the Town of LaFayette, County of Onondaga, is hereby authorized to adopt a budget for the fiscal year 2018 that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the limit specified in the New York General Municipal Law § 3-c.

Section 4. SEVERABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, article or part of this local law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operations to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section, article, or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

Section 5. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall take effect immediately.

Supervisor Daniel introduced proposed Local Law No. C-2017, authorizing the Town of LaFayette Town Board to override the limit on the amount of real property

taxes that may be levied by the Town of LaFayette pursuant to General Municipal Law § 3-c, and to allow the Town of LaFayette to adopt a Town budget for the fiscal year 2018 which is in excess of the “tax levy limit,” and made the following motion, which was seconded by Councilor Palmer.

WHEREAS, the Town Board has considered the adoption of said Local Law, has considered the criteria contained in 6 N.Y.C.R.R. Part 617.7 and has compared the impacts which may be reasonably expected to result from the adoption of said Local Law against said criteria;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is

RESOLVED AND DETERMINED, that no other agency has the legal authority or jurisdiction to approve or directly undertake the enactment of a local law in the Town of LaFayette, such that there are no other involved agencies within the meaning of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQR) with respect to the proposed enactment of said Local Law, with the result that the Town Board shall act as lead agency in this matter; and it is further

RESOLVED AND DETERMINED, that the enactment of said Local Law is a Type II action for purposes of environmental review under SEQR and will have no adverse environmental impact, thus concluding the SEQR review process; and it is further

RESOLVED, that the Town Board shall conduct a public hearing as to the enactment of proposed Local Law No. C-2017 at the Town Hall located at 2577 Route 11 in the Town on October 10, 2017 at 7:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter can be heard, at which time all persons interested in the subject shall be heard.

F. Resolution/ Final Draft of the recapture resolution regarding FEMA, Supervisor Daniel asked for clarification on this. Tom Chartrand advised that this is something he got from one of his other towns and their attorney recommended this based on the fact they had not done their bonding resolution yet. What this does is it is like a pre-cursor to your bonding and its stating that you will be spending monies at this point prior to going out to bonding for the FEMA projects. As discussed while reviewing bills there are some bills for gravel and materials that have gone into the repairs and since we don't have a final figure on what the storm damage repairs will be we should place the resolution authorizing us to spend money prior to going out to bonding. Attorney Gilligan elaborated by saying that it allows you to re-capture expenses that you're incurring now when you do bond it or get the FEMA money and pull them back into the general budget so that you can continue to run the town.

The following resolution was offered by Town Board member Douglas Daniel, who moved its adoption, and second by Town Board member Melanie Palmer to wit:

RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN OF LAFAYETTE, ONONDAGA COUNTY, NEW YORK, DECLARING OFFICIAL INTENT TO REIMBURSE AN ORIGINAL EXPENDITURE FROM THE TOWN'S GENERAL FUND WITH THE PROCEEDS OF TAX-EXEMPT INDEBTEDNESS IN ACCORDANCE WITH TREASURY REGULATION SECTION 1.150-2.

WHEREAS, the Town of LaFayette, Onondaga County, New York (the "Town") is considering undertaking a capital improvement project as more specifically described in Schedule "A" attached hereto (collectively, the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Town currently estimates that the Project will cost approximately \$900,000.00; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and applicable Treasury Regulations require the Town to make this declaration in connection with the payment of certain expenses of the Project prior to the issuance of tax-exempt notes and bonds, in order to allow the Town to be reimbursed for such expenditures from the proceeds of such tax-exempt notes and bonds; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN OF LAFAYETTE, ONONDAGA, NEW YORK, AS FOLLOWS:

1. The statements contained in this resolution with respect to the reimbursement of the expenditures described in this resolution are intended to be statements of official intent as required by, and in conformance with, the provisions of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2(e).
2. The expenditures made from the Town's general fund which are intended to be reimbursed pursuant to this Resolution have been incurred within 60 days prior to the date hereof (or earlier to the extent permitted under the applicable regulation) or will be incurred after the date hereof in connection with the Project.
3. The cost of the Project is estimated to be \$900,000.00 and the estimated maximum principal amount of the notes and/or bonds to be issued by the Town to finance the Project is \$900,000.00.
4. The Town reasonably expects to reimburse the expenditures set forth in this resolution with the proceeds of tax-exempt debt to be incurred by the Town subsequent to the date hereof, but this resolution does not commit the Town to a definite course of future decisions nor does it constitute a binding obligation to undertake the Project nor issue such debt.

5. The resolution shall take effect immediately.

G. Proposed Local Law D-2017 to amend the 1970 Zoning Ordinance and add a new article regulating Solar Energy, Supervisor Daniel explained that the solar committee has not yet finished their due diligence on the final proposal to bring before the board. The town is looking to re-vamp the solar energy regulations that we currently have to accommodate new solar energy producing locations within the town. It is currently set up to go into Agricultural district and part of our Comprehensive Plan says that the town needs to protect the Ag District so that it is maintained. This will be revisited at the October 10th, 2017 town board meeting.

H. Verizon/Groth Road Tower Agreement – discussion recapping the negotiation of the Agreement took place, focusing on the \$5,000.00 bonus that Crescendo would be receiving and the Town of LaFayette will be expecting 50% of the bonus equaling \$2500.00., and the monthly lease payment.

I. Shared Services Plan – Removal of Items – Supervisor Daniel advised that as this was just brought before the board and the county vote is to be held tomorrow, September 13, 2017 they will abstain from voting on this at this time.

J. Asbestos Project Notification Fee Waiver Form in regards to the demolition of the old highway garage.

Councilor Palmer moved and Evans seconded the motion approving Supervisor Daniel to sign the Asbestos Project Notification Fee Waiver Form. Motion carried 4 -0.

7. OPEN COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE PUBLIC – Supervisor Daniel commented that we had a pretty big crowd tonight and also advised that Public Communications will be held to a 5 minute per person time frame in order per Town Board Meeting, policy and procedures.

A. In attendance were several residents who reside in the Festival Garden Apartments. They stated that all of the residents received a letter from USDA stating that they owner is seeking to sell the property, and in doing this it will displace most of the residents because they will lose their subsidy. They will not be able to afford what have been their homes for some 20 + years. The residents were looking for assistance from the town to tell USDA that this will be detrimental to many residents and that it will hurt our town. They stated that the residents of the apartments are elderly, single parents, disabled who really have nowhere else to go. Councilor Palmer said in quickly reviewing the letter stated that the letter sounds as if USDA is working to help the resident's and Supervisor Daniel advised that while he sympathized with them he wasn't sure if there was anything the town could do to stop this from happening. Scott Kosturik, the property manager said that they were hoping for a letter from the town in support of the tenants or a petition endorsed by the town. Supervisor Daniel advised again he doesn't know what if anything they can do but he will look into it and see if there is anything that we can do.

Councilor Zajac asked what the voucher program was that is mentioned in the letter they all received. It was explained that that voucher allows them to pay (2) two months' rent at the cost they are currently paying but after that it goes up to the fair market rate, so it is only a temporary fix.

B. Martin Ossenberg a member of R.A.M.P.S. addressed the Town Board stating that he was asking the same (3) three questions he has been asking:

Q: Has the Building Officer requested that the farmer apply for a building permit?

A: No

Q: Has the Building Officer issued a stop work order to the farmer?

A: No

Q: Has the Zoning officer, Mr. Lamson notified Griswold (the farmer) that he must comply with Article 7; Sections A & B

A: Supervisor Daniel deferred to Ralph Lamson to which questioned which sections he was referring to again. Mr. Ossenburg advised Article 7; sections A & B. Mr. Lamson advised he will look into it.

- C. In summation Supervisor Daniel invited Dan Compitello from Cypress Creek who are in the process of starting a solar farm on Palladino road. He just wanted him to revisit this and explain how it merges with or goes against the town's comprehensive plan. Dan explained that they thoroughly reviewed our plan and found that pretty much every section of our plan; Natural Resources, Agriculture, Hamlet development, Economic development, Housing, Educational resources, etc...; are complimented by their goals as a solar farm.

8. REPORTS

1. Town Supervisor

a. Budget Officer Tom Chartrand submitted the Monthly Financial Report stating that is was a fairly quiet month; court fines are still a bit behind year to date but they are improving; we received our final snow/ice removal funds from the county for 2016-2017 year and we ended up about \$3,600 above what we originally estimated in the budget due to some changes in road miles etc... On the expenditure side there were (3) three bi-weekly payrolls in recorded August so the payroll numbers look large but that is because of the extra payroll not because of overtime. The highway abstract at \$228,000 looks large, \$192,000 was the bonding, the BAN for the (2) two trucks, \$65,000 was paid off and \$127,000 was a renewal.

2. Highway Superintendent Report –

Superintendent Greeley paid tribute to the loss of our former Highway Superintendent Leon Cook who served our community for 30+ years and a moment of silence was held in his honor. Greeley also advised that the highway department will be making a donation to the LaFayette Fire Department in Leon's name.

Roads- Fall brush pick up is completed – including any leftover storm damage. Brush will be ground up in October. Efforts are being made to sell excess wood chips to certain vendors. Wood mulch will still be available to residents for free.

- Mowing Ops continue on town roads.
- All 2017 surface treating of town roads are complete

- Cascade road culvert pipe is still damaged and needs repair before winter.
- Morezak Road findings ... Martin Voss Agreement
- 2018 Local Highway listing inventory that they do every year is complete.
- NYSDOT 2018 Shared Services Contract is signed – with no changes.
- 4 year Onondaga County Contract signed – County will pay a flat rate of \$7,287.00 per lane mile in 2018 and a subsequent 2% increase each year until 2021. The highway department will also received a winter severity rate if applicable the same as the Tug Hill Region which is beneficial to the town.
- (In 2018 the county will pay \$177,511.32) for 24.36 miles.

Highway Committee / Equipment – The highway committee met on 9/5/17 and Superintendent Greeley advised that he will defer to the Highway Committee Chair and Town Board Councilor Steve Zajac as the their findings. Zajac advised that at the highway committee meeting they voted unanimously to put the '99 International into surplus on Auctions International. On the budget side we have a problem with the front end loader; it has a bad bearing in the transmission. To repair it will cost \$24,927 and a new one will cost \$41,469 that is with (1) one month rental while it is at the mechanic being repaired. It is a lot better than buying a new one as the hours on this one are very low. A new one is \$156,000. We will have to work that into the budget. Supervisor Daniel recapped the details given by councilor Zajac and Superintendent Greeley said that they are going to go easy with it and look at it with Tom and maybe add it as a separate line item in the budget and once the budget is approved then get it repaired; it will take approximately (30) thirty days to repair and the warranty is the same whether it is new or reman.

Supervisor Daniel also asked Greeley about the status of FEMA. Greeley said that he received letter from C& S Engineering regarding the roads to mitigate all the storm damage that we had. Dan Weirs has acknowledge receipt of the individual damage break down and advised that NYS Dept of Homeland Security Emergency Services believes that we have reached the threshold to make us eligible for FEMA public assistance. They are convinced that we will be covered. We are just waiting and as soon as we hear something someone from FEMA will come into meet with us and go over costs. Greeley is going to try to get the cost of our skid steer and loader, that were used during the storm, included into these monies admittedly this is a long shot but worth a try.

3. Town Clerk

a. Monthly Report - Town Clerk August Monthly Report is in the Town Board's packet for their review.

5. Building & Zoning Code Enforcement / SPDES –

a. Ralph Lamson submitted the August Building Permit Report and advised that we are up to (62) sixty-two building permits this year which is pretty much on par and that he got his (24) twenty-four hours of continuing education last week.

8. Library Director – David Prince advised that there is not much going on at the library but there are some personnel changes so we may see some new faces.

9. Parks & Recreation - David Prince mowing is slowing down as the weather cools off so that is freeing ups some time. One issue is that he noticed NYS DOT was looking at the trees behind the pond on Rte. 81, they are looking at the trees; (1) one is dead and another is damaged and almost dead they may have them take both down. They would like access to the trees through the park rather than on 81 so they don't have to do a lane closure and for safety. Supervisor Daniel asked if we need anything from the NYS,(i.e. insurance, an agreement, etc..) Attorney Gilligan advised that we should have an agreement stating that what they are doing, the fact that it will cost nothing to the town and most importantly that they will indemnify and hold harmless the town if there were any damages or injuries or anything and provide proof of insurance both liability and workers comp. Tom Chartrand questioned if we entered into a shared agreement with the state in emergency situations, Attorney Gilligan was not sure.

Councilor Evans moved and Councilor Palmer seconded the motion to enter into an agreement with the State of New York to remove (2) two trees at the rear of the town property at Stafford Park subject to a written agreement with the State indemnifying the town from any damages or injuries and they provide proof of insurance and authorize the Supervisor to sign said agreement
