




From Our Town Historian Rick Stout

The Life and Times of the Lafayette Hotel 1871-1971

There was an air of excitement on April, 1871 in LaFayette when an announcement was made: "We are rejoicing in the prospect of a new hotel. Mr. George W. McIntyre, the owner and proprietor of the old store, having received liberal encouragement from the citizens by way of subscriptions for the purpose, has broken ground for an addition to his building 36 X 40 feet in extent to be used as a hotel. In the third story will be a hall to be used for town purposes. The project will be pushed through vigorously." Mr. McIntyre's old store was the first framed hotel in LaFayette built by October 1807. This is the middle portion of the hotel with the gable end facing west. In order to build this addition, McIntyre purchased the shoe and harness shop of James Keeler Jr. which stood on the corner, originally occupied by Orange King's famous log tavern built about 1800.

Two early newspaper entries follow the progress of the hotel. "William A Felter has rented the hotel of Mr. McIntyre and has procured a license. He is now ready to entertain his guests in the most approved style." (Journal, May 17,1877) "Mr. McIntyre is fixing up his store and hotel considerably and putting new blinds on the hotel." (Courier, Apr. 28,1879) The first floor, beginning at the north end, was the public parlor next to the bar. On the upper floor was the ballroom and a general store was located in the original part of the building. In the cellar, with doors facing north, was a kitchen and dining room. On the south end of the structure McIntyre built living quarters for his family. In the ballroom every kind of public gathering and social event was held such as



medical shows, theatricals, dances and town meetings. In addition, the Roman Catholic Mass was said from 1883 to 1889 and in 1889 the post office moved there. In one corner was a room used as a lock-up for the village drunks.

In the Standard, May 30, 1885 we find "Mr. James Conan has taken possession of George W. McIntyre's store having leased it for a term of years." Shortly thereafter the times were changing.

"The town of LaFayette voted no license at the annual town meeting in February." (Tully Times, May 1892) The town being "dry" was a very contentious issue and indignation meetings were held by both sides of it. In 1893 the question was put up for vote again and license was restored. Finally in 1903 the "dry" cause won once again and James Conan knew the days of his hotel were over.

Within the next ten years the old hotel was mostly vacant and fast becoming an eye-sore. Across the street the Crowe Brother's store was out-growing its rented building, and with urging from friends, James and Michael Crowe purchased the hotel in January, 1915. During the summer of 1916 the hotel was raised four feet and placed on a new foundation. Twenty feet were built onto both the north end and the east side. In 1919 they installed a gasoline pump. In the mid 1930's an overhang was built over what was now two gas pumps. In October, 1945 the building was sold to Sam and John Long. They modernized the interior of the store, added a lunch counter and built ten apartments on the upper floors of the building. In 1963 John Long sold the business to Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Stiles who moved to their new IGA store January 11, 1972.

SHREDDING - this free service is for residents, including businesses, so bring your personal paperwork, business files, tax returns, statements & bills, etc. to the Town Hall upper parking lot. Watch your papers be shredded on site, via a video camera attached to the shredding truck. It is then locked and taken to a waste management site for recycling. This saves you time and saves our environment and gives you piece of mind that your personal documents are secure.

MEDICATION DISPOSAL - Is your medicine cabinet



full of unwanted and expired drugs or medications you no longer use? Seven out of 10 people who abuse prescription drugs get

them from friends or relatives. I have coordinated a prescription take back event to take place during the shredding event. With all of the prescription drug abuse we hear of, let's get them disposed of properly for the safety of our kids, families and environment. What's safe for you might be harmful for someone else. You can dispose of your expired, unwanted, or unused medicines when you drop off your shredding...

HANDICAP PERMITS – Applications available here or at your doctor's office.

DEPT. OF CONSERVATION LICENSING Hunting, fishing, trapping, Duck Stamps, etc. are all available.

DOG LICENSING Just a reminder: <u>ALL DOGS MUST</u>
<u>BE LICENSED</u>. You have the option of licensing your dog for one to three years now. The cost per year is \$8.00 for spay and neutered dogs and \$20.00 for unsprayed and unneutered dogs. When

doing a multiple year license, the license expiration date must be before the expiration date of the rabies vaccination. Replacement tag fee: \$3.00; Impoundment fee: \$150.00. Please be responsible for your pets.

If you have any questions or situations involving a dog, please call dog control. If you have a concern regarding wild-life animals, you may call (607) 753-3095. If you see any suspicious/strange acting animals (possible rabies) please contact the Department of Environmental Conservation Police at (315) 426-7431.

RABIES CLINICS - Per Onondaga Dept of Health - PLEASE NOTE: Due to COVID-19, safe and socially-distanced drive-thru clinics are being planned in place of the regular clinic schedule. Go to www.ongov.net/health/env/rabies.html and on their Facebook page as they are planned. Veterinarian offices and some local pet supply stores can also provide the shot, call ahead for more information.

Did you also know that you can get your pet's rabies vaccine & more done at Tractor Supply, every Thursday between 5:30pm -7 pm (6641 Manlius Center Rd, East Syracuse) by the Pet Vet Affordable Preventative Clinic?

For missed pick-ups; please contact Dependable Disposal directly at (315) 472-7455 Ext 25 (Christine) The hours of pick-up may vary as there is no exact service time, however your bins need to be out the night before or by 5:00 AM. They also provide service of picking up larger items such as couches, etc. for an extra fee and you must call for a special pick-up.

HOLIDAYS THAT INTERRUPT TRASH SERVICE Memorial Day, 4th of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's Day. If the holiday falls on or before your pick-up day within that week, pick-up is delayed one day.

Its spring again, Hope everyone is well and survived this long winter. We have some dates to remember as we proceed into spring and early summer.

- Annual Brush Pick-up: April 11 thru May 5. All brush must be out on your road side by April 11, to save money due to rising fuel cost we would like to make one trip around our town. Please place your brush butt end first towards the road and no longer than 8' (please no bags of leaves or other debris). This brush will be recycled into mulch and provided to the residents free of charge at the Highway Garage starting on April 11th. Brush may be dropped off during Town Clean-Up Days as per hours of operation listed below.
- <u>Earth Day:</u> April 22, Please Help Clean-Up Our Town, the highway will be open Friday April 22 from 7 am to 2:30 pm for drop off and Saturday April 23 from 9 am till 2 pm. You can register with OCRRA at https://ocrra.org/contact-us/earth-day-signup-form/



Solar Farms in LaFayette

Lately, solar farms have been the subject of

activities in the Town of LaFayette. There is a solar farm newly constructed on Sentinel Heights Road (across the road from the gas pipeline facility) by C2 Energy Development. There is a farm being proposed for 3660 Apulia Road by Carley Farm Solar, LLC and Dimon Solar, LLC. Last summer, Supervisor McConnell requested the LACC to review the current town law about solar farms (Town Code §290-32(H)) and recommend changes to update it and, more recently, align it with the newly adopted Comprehensive Plan. The changes were approved by the Town Board on March 8. This article describes the overarching interests LACC considered when developing its recommendations. As a group focused on conservation, the LACC understands the long-term benefits that solar energy provides, primarily with respect to natural resource preservation and air pollution reduction. We also know that solar farms can

LaFayette's new Comprehensive Plan makes clear that our residents highly value our open spaces, farmlands, and scenic vistas. According to resident surveys, it is the most valued Town asset. One of five goals in the Plan is dedicated to preserving these valued resources. By requiring by law that solar farm developers address potential negative impacts, we can have solar farms that align with the Town's goal to preserve rural character.

have, if not properly sited and/or designed, a

primarily in the form of visual impacts and, to a

negative impact on the local community,

lesser degree, noise and soil erosion.

Bottom line, we want solar farms in our community that do not impact the peaceful enjoyment of living in LaFayette. Therefore, going into our review we considered the balance of interests of three groups of people:

- Town residents
- Property owners (land lessor)
- Solar farm developers (land lessee)

Residents don't want to be affected by the types of potential impacts already mentioned. Property owners want to lease their land for solar farms because the lease payments can help keep the farms in the family and/or



can be used to support other parts of their farm businesses. At the end of the solar farm's life, they want their property left undamaged and with all traces of the solar farm removed at no cost to them. Solar farm developers want fair and clear regulations.

We began our research by reviewing what other towns have incorporated in their solar farms laws. To strive for fairness with solar farm owners, it was important our recommendations would be reasonable. Most of our recommendations were borrowed from other towns.

We also added specificity to the law, making it clearer to both applicants and the Town Planning Board. We specified the farms and public scenic vistas that we want to preserve, as identified in the new Comprehensive Plan. We also added objectiveness to parts of the law, particularly with respect to visual impacts, which sometimes can be considered subjective.

Our final analysis yielded recommendations in 13 areas. Most were selected to help protect property owners (e.g., strengthened decommissioning and bonding requirements) and the community (e.g., greater communication about public hearings, larger setbacks, more approvals by the Town, strengthened topsoil and stormwater management and visual impact requirements).

Our next planned article will explain how residents can reduce their energy costs while supporting solar farms in our Town. This is known as Community Solar.



From the LaFayette Rural Cemetery




