In February, the Town Board approved an agreement with the Town and Village of Tully to provide a long-term water source solution to the residents in the Cardiff water district. Below is a summary of the project in addition to other ongoing community development projects.

### **Cardiff Water**

It was reported in the last newsletter that the Town is working with the Town and Village of Tully on a memorandum of understanding to provide a long-term source of water for the 28 parcels in the existing Cardiff Water District. Since then, the memorandum was finalized and approved by the Town Board.

The next step is to evaluate the feasibility of the expansion of the water district to other properties along Route 11A, south of Route 20, and possibly along the adjacent roads. The Town of Tully is also planning to evaluate expansion of its existing Route 11A water district to connect to the Village of Tully as the new source of water for these valley areas. Once the expansion is decided, engineering reports will be prepared with maps and estimated cost to construct. These reports are required for funding applications.

To that end, the Town Board selected Barton & Loguidice (B&L) to provide engineering services for the planning and design of the upgraded and expanded water district. The first step will involve an income survey, an analysis of expansion alternatives, and the first funding applications. By the next newsletter, they will have completed those items and the engineering reports, all to be ready for more funding applications.

Supervisor McConnell has recently met with the County IDA executive and Congressman Williams to brief them on the project and talk about funding opportunities. The Town is pursuing funding together with the Town and Village of Tully.

### **Crossroads Building**

In the last newsletter, the results of the community survey about what to do with the Crossroads Building (on a corner of Routes 11 and 20) were presented. The survey revealed that a majority of residents prefer that the building be rehabilitated and put back into commercial use as a restaurant and inn. The Town Board voted at its January 9 meeting to pursue rehabilitation. Since then, the Town re-engaged with Hanover Real Estate Development to discuss project development details that would be part of a purchase and sale agreement between the Town and Hanover.

### Town Takes on Cardiff Water Project cont'd...

The Town also retained legal services to form a Local Development Corporation (LDC) that is required to legally negotiate the agreement. By the next newsletter, the Town expects to form the LDC and transfer the properties to the LDC, and the LDC will sign an agreement with Hanover.

There are six other projects planned, depending on remaining grant funds. Most of the remodeling should be done before our bicentennial celebration next year.

including businesses, so bring your personal paperwork, business files, tax returns, statements & bills, etc. to the Town Hall upper parking lot. Watch

your papers be shredded on site, via a video camera attached to the shredding truck. It is then locked and taken to a waste management site for recycling. This saves you time and saves our environment and gives you piece of mind that your personal documents are secure.

#### **MEDICATION DISPOSAL**



Is your medicine cabinet full of unwanted and expired drugs or medications you no longer *use*? Seven out of 10

people who abuse prescription drugs get them from friends or relatives. A prescription take back event will take place during the shredding event. With all of the prescription drug abuse we hear of, let's get them disposed of properly for the safety of our kids, families and environment. What's safe for you might be harmful for someone else. You can dispose of your expired, unwanted, or unused medicines when you drop off your shredding.

### From the Highway Department



Its spring again, Hope everyone is well and enjoyed this mild winter. We have some changes and dates to remember as we proceed into spring.

<u>Please Take Note:</u> Effective March 6, 2024 the Town of LaFayette Highway will no longer accept any Electronic Waste at our facility or during our annual Town Clean-up Days May 4<sup>th</sup> thru May 11th. This is due to the safety risks associated with accepting anything that has a Lithium-lon Battery. At this time, I am working diligently to reinstate accepting electronic waste without taking anything with a Lithium-lon Battery to mitigate the risks.

The regulations that are required by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation to be listed as a "Registered NYS Electronic Waste Collection Site", states we cannot pick and choose what electronics we accept at this time. I have provided alternate locations for recycling all of your electronic waste at no charge, please see the following link to the Department of Environmental Conservation collection site listing. <a href="https://dec.ny.gov//sites/default/files/2023-12/ewcosites.pdf">https://dec.ny.gov//sites/default/files/2023-12/ewcosites.pdf</a> (scroll to Onondaga County). 

### From our Safety Officer—Lithium-ion Battery Safety

On February 2, 2024, New York City Fire Commissioner, Laura Kavanagh, announced that lithium-ion batteries have recently become a leading cause of fires and fire deaths in New York City and that the problem is growing nationwide. This announcement was prophetic. On February 22nd, just 20 days later, a New York Journalist was killed in a New York City apartment fire that also injured at least 18 others. The cause of the fire was a lithium-ion battery. From January 1 to February 22 there have been 31 fires caused by lithium-ion batteries in the city. Thirty-one fires in fifty-three days.

The problem is not restricted to New York City. On Tuesday, March 5th, the Skyline apartments in Syracuse caught fire. The cause? Lithium-ion batteries. Lithium-ion battery fires happen everywhere.

Explosions and fires from cell phones, e-bike batteries, and even e-cigarettes are just a few of the many lithium-ion devices reported in the news that have been injuring or killing people. Although the problem is getting worse due to the growing use of these batteries, there is very slow movement on the part of safety regulators to adequately address this situation.

The list below includes a few examples of lithiumion devices commonly found in homes.



#### **Lithium-ion home devices** (a few examples)

- 1. Smartwatch
- 2. E-readers and laptop computers
- 3. Cell phones
- 4. Rechargeable vacuum cleaners
- 5. Rechargeable shavers
- 6. Many toys (ex. Helicopters)
- 7. Rechargeable drills and lawnmowers

- 8. Cameras
- 9. Bluetooth Speakers
- 10. Rechargeable lithium-ion flashlights
- 11. Lithium-ion smoking vapes
- 12. Rechargeable headphones & hearing aids

Following are lists of Warning Signs, Safety Tips, and Disposal Suggestions for Lithium-ion batteries.
These lists were derived from the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), the National Fire Protection Agency, the NYS Department of State's Division of Consumer Protection, and the NYS Homeland Security Emergency Services.

### Warning signs

Stop using your device if you notice an unusual odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking fluid, odd noises such as hissing, popping, or cracking, or if the device is smoking.

#### **Safety Tips**

- 1. OSHA recommends that you **read and follow the manufacturer's instructions** for your device.
- 2. Do **not hold** the device if warning signs appear. A fire or explosion can occur within seconds.
- 3. Unplug the device (if plugged in) and immediately leave the area to avoid injury and call 911.
- 4. Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- 5. Do not charge the device under your pillow, on your bed, or a couch or chair.
- 6. Do not let batteries set in the sun. Do not charge them where it is below **32** or above **105**.
- 7. Store batteries in a cool, dry place, away from flammables, and **do not pile them** on each other.
- Put electrical tape on the battery terminals of stored batteries (do not remove batteries from devices unless they were made to allow safe removal).
- Look for safety labels such as "UL," "SA," and "NSF," on devices and check for battery damage.
- 10. Always plug the charger directly into the wall (not a power strip) and **do not overcharge**.

### From our Safety Officer cont'd...

#### **Disposal Suggestions**

- Never put a lithium battery in the trash. May temporarily store a dead battery in a cool, dry area out of sunlight and away from flammables. Keep batteries separated and terminals taped.
- 2. Recycle batteries at battery recycling site as soon as possible (battery may still be dangerous).
- 3. If batteries are damaged, place in fire resistant container (e.g., metal drum) with sand or other extinguishing agent, and dispose in accordance with local, state, and federal regulations. **Call** your approved battery

 As soon as you see lights, vests or reflectors, check traffic around you, SLOW DOWN and safely MOVE OVER.







### The Return of General LaFayette to CNY

In the last newsletter it was noted that 1825 was an important year for LaFayette as that is when it became a town (April 15) and it was the year the Erie Canal was opened. The Erie Canal was the impetus for creating a good connecting thoroughfare from Tully to Syracuse which led to the construction of the Syracuse-Tully Plank Road in 1848, just the 2<sup>nd</sup> of its kind. Lastly, 1825 is noted for General LaFayette's visit to Central New York.

LaFayette had received numerous invitations to visit America but delayed such a trip because of the French political situation. During the French upheavals he was reduced to poverty and could no longer afford such a trip. However, as a result of requests in the form of resolutions of both Houses of Congress and a personal invitation from President Monroe, he decided to make the trip. He arrived in New York City on August 15, 1824, accompanied by his son George Washington LaFayette, who was in charge of the itinerary. From August 15, 1824 to September 9, 1825, LaFayette covered over 6,000 miles by carriage, stagecoach, canal boat, and steamboat, traveling to all 24 states. His legend had only grown over the 40 years since his last visit. The tour was one continual succession of receptions, parades, banquets, balls, speeches, band playing, picnics, fireworks and public functions of every kind. Few men could have maintained this schedule, but he truly enjoyed it.

So it was that on June 6<sup>th</sup> in Lockport, New York, LaFayette traveled the Erie Canal on the canal boat "Rochester" heading east to Albany. LaFayette came through Central New York with much haste, traveling day and night, in order to be in Boston for the laying of the cornerstone of the Bunker Hill Monument on June 17<sup>th</sup>. The itinerary called for LaFayette to stay on the canal until Albany, but at Rochester he unexpectedly changed his plans and accepted an invitation by letter from James Rees of Geneva to visit him and the village. He never went back to the canal boat but traveled by land and boarded the same canal boat which was waiting for him at Syracuse. The overland route gave him an opportunity to see the Finger Lakes and took him through Canandaigua, Geneva, Waterloo, Cayuga, Auburn, Skaneateles, Marcellus, Onondaga Hill, Onondaga Hollow and Syracuse. He arrived in Syracuse June 9<sup>th</sup> at 6:30AM having had no sleep for 48 hours, traveling day and night. All the towns despite having little advance notice came out in force to welcome LaFayette with all sorts of celebrations. This was as close as LaFayette would get to our town. We don't know what might have happened if it were not for the time constraints to get to Boston by the 17<sup>th</sup>. LaFayette missed us in 1825 but I am pleased to inform you that LaFayette will not miss us in 2025. I know of at least 2 events where he will make a public appearance in LaFayette, that being the April 15', 2025 Town Hall Meeting and the 2025 Memorial Day Parade where LaFayette will be riding a horse! In addition, the national organization of the American Friends of LaFayette are recreating the exact itinerary complete with speeches and celebrations of LaFayette's 1824-25 tour.

The kickoff for all of the years' celebrations will be the April 15, 2025 Town Board Meeting at the High School. Invitations will have been sent out to mayors and supervisors of all towns and cities named LaFayette. The High School band will be performing a song composed for just this event. There will be a table of desserts and appetizers supplied by the Big Picture School. Various awards including essay awards will be given out to honor certain LaFayette citizens. Old photos of LaFayette will be shown. Roy Dodge is writing a new book to be ready in time for this event. This promises to be one Town Board Meeting you will not want to miss.

### **Verizon FIOS Broadband Update**

I am sure many of you have noticed the Verizon trucks around town carrying large spools of fiberoptic cable. This is part of the Onondaga County fifteen-million-dollar broadband project which County Executive

Ryan McMahon and I initiated to bring high speed internet to all areas of the County. Verizon is also putting in seven million dollars of their own money. Due to the mild winter Verizon has been able to continue installing cable all season long and are running ahead of schedule. They are anticipating having the necessary infrastructure in place within the next few months. The primary goal of this initiative was to get broadband to those who had no access or very limited access to broadband internet. As soon as Verizon is ready to start connecting customers, they will be sending postcards to all households that were identified as being in need of broadband internet with instructions on how to proceed. Once that phase of installation is completed any residence or business that is along the path where cable was installed will also have access to Verizon FIOS. Please keep a watch of the Town website, Facebook page, or call the Town office for further updates as we get closer to the rollout of this exciting project. —Dave Knapp, Onondaga County Legislator

### From LaFayette Advisory Conservation Commission

### Is Air Quality In The US Worse Now Than 10 Or More Years Ago?

Outdoor air concentrations of the six most common pollutants have steadily decreased ever since 1990 when regulations were implemented to reduce air pollution emissions<sup>1</sup>. For the last 10 years, average air concentrations have been below standards set to protect our health. Only 20 years ago, four of these pollutants were above standards, on average.


These are averages across the US and throughout a given year. Therefore, there are some places on some days where air quality is unhealthy. Currently, many areas in the country have days when air quality, primary ozone and particulate, exceeds standards (*i.e.*, unhealthy levels). Fortunately for us, no Upstate NY counties are exceeding air quality standards (based on averages). But last year's unhealthy level of particulate from the Canadian wildfires was a very rare air quality exceedance for our county.

### What contributes to air pollution?

This illustration shows the major sources of air pollution, much of which burn fossil fuels (e.g., coal, natural gas, and propane). Transportation is a large source of emissions, as well as residential, commercial and industrial heating and cooling systems. Therefore, areas of high-density traffic and buildings (e.g., cities) and near industrial plants will typically have days of unhealthy air quality.

### What does the improvement mean to my health?

Both short-term and long-term exposures to unhealthy levels of these pollutants primarily harm our respiratory system and increase our risk for heart



disease and lung cancer. People with medical conditions such as asthma are particularly affected. The improvement in air quality from 1990 to 2010 reduced the number of deaths related to air pollution by nearly half<sup>2</sup>, which is significant by itself and even more so considering the expanding economy, population, miles traveled, and energy usage<sup>3</sup>. But there is still 1 in 35 deaths related to air pollution, which is the same death rate as vehicle accidents and gun shooting combined.<sup>2</sup>

#### What else should be done to protect our health?

Our air quality will continue to improve as new regulations catalyze additional technology and infrastructures in the fields of renewable energy and electric vehicles and heating/cooling systems. More lives each year will be saved. But the greatest improvements yet to be made will be the reduction of pollutants not regulated until 2011.

In 1990, carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases were not pollutants of primary concern. Since, we learned they contribute to climate change, which is harmful to our planet and therefore to our future. In addition, the recent record hot temperatures are resulting in increasing ozone levels, and thus are harmful to our health.

Fossil fuel combustion is the primary source of cardon dioxide. Therefore, more renewable energy and less fossil fuel usage will help in slowing climate change and lowering air pollution.

#### What can any of us do?

The second article in this series will partially answer this question, where we will look at the pro and cons of heat pumps.
