Happy 2017 Residents! Here are a few reminders as we head into March:

- Please adhere to State, County and Town Laws by not plowing snow across public highways.
- No parking on streets, roads and turnarounds from November 1st until April 1st. Blocking the highway and turnarounds will prevent Plows, School buses and Emergency vehicles from doing their job.
- Remember: Plowing speeds can not exceed 25 MPH. Be Patient! Arrive Alive!
- Christmas tree recycling program: Please drop off

your Christmas tree at the Highway Garage (2849 Route 11 North). Look for the "Christmas tree" drop off sign. All trees are recycled back to the residents in the spring as free mulch.

Recycling Matters to the Highway Department! Biannual brush pick-up will begin in April.
 Please get sticks and branches out to the road-side Asap. Due to the Extremely busy schedule, the Highway Department will be by only once! We will come back again in August to pick-up summertime branches and sticks.

Contractors that cut down trees are responsible for their removal. Please continue to drive safelycheck wiper blades and washer fluid.

Leave extra time for travel during snow events. School closings will be posted on our Highway Face-book page and Town of Lafayette Facebook page usually before 6:00 am. *God Bless!* Plow Trucks are ready to go!

Adrian Shute, Pete Paul, Ron Bush and John Greeley also reflected on the numerous ways in which Highway Superintendent Leon Cook served his Town each and every day in those 30 years. Thank you for taking such great care of our roads for all those years. Rest in peace, Leon, you are a "one of a kind", and the Town of LaFayette misses you.

Cross your Fingers for LaFayette Square

or nearly four years, Town Supervisors and board members, our County Legislator, volunteers and professionals in LaFayette, worked together to resolve the ongoing vacancy and decline of the old LaFayette Hotel. The building was assessed, ideas hatched, new technologies introduced, and a vision of a rehabilitated building with a café and apple museum was featured in our newsletter, along with an article titled "Memorable **Streets Draw More Pedestrians (and more** business!)" The point was that a "Historic, Agricultural Small Town Brand", combined with successful local businesses, could contribute to preserving our 'Built Heritage'. The article – like the Town's Comprehensive Plan – proposed that the hamlet should be the focus of economic and community development, starting with saving and revitalizing the hamlet's oldest building.

Fortunately, over the same four years, while a community vision for the old hotel was hatching, a local business (Ichor Therapeutics) was growing, doubling in size annually, and purchasing a new building every 18 months. With plans to expand again in 2018, Ichor was anticipating the need for more space to house professional and research staff near its headquarters in the hamlet.

Occasionally, New York State announces grantfunding opportunities aimed at solving problems like old, vacant buildings with good bones, in great

locations, but that need a lot of work. The "Restore New York Communities" grant program was announced in September. The funding is intended to support rehabilitation of sites and buildings that have the potential to impact economic and community development; but funding must be applied for by a municipality. To win a grant award, a project would have to be so convincing that the State would select it over dozens of others, and the application would need to be submitted by December 15, 2017 - a tall order. Could this funding opportunity bring together the needs

of the Town with those of a growing local business? Could the stars be aligning for the old hotel? That was the question to explore – and to answer quickly!

At a November public hearing, the community expressed enthusiastic support for the idea. With assistance from the CNY Regional Planning & Development Board (CNY RPDB), the town resolved to submit a grant proposal in December to rehabilitate the building. Winning grant awards will be announced in May or June of 2018. If LaFayette wins the grant award through this public-private collaboration, a hamlet master plan would logically follow as a next step; and then the old LaFayette Hotel building can be brought back to life at "LaFayette Square". That project name fits because throughout the 19th century the town center was known as "LaFayette Square" (as documented in Roy Dodge's book "Crossroads Town"); and all the more so, since the acre at its center, "a public grounds", was noted in a deed to be "for the erection of any public buildings and other public use, but never to be converted to individual property, for a term as long as wood grows and water runs."

So now, we wait – fingers crossed!





From the Parks Department

Stafford Park Recreation Path

In an effort to provide town residents with year round opportunities for outdoor recreation this winter, the town's Parks Department will attempt to clear and maintain the south section of the recreation path at Stafford Park. Due to the park bathrooms being closed during the winter, a portapotty is available in this section of the park.

The south section of recreation path is the portion of the path that encircles the playing fields near the concession stand and can be accessed from the park entrance and parking lot closest to the new Highway Garage. Please **DO NOT** walk around the highway garage – the presence of large trucks and equipment create hazardous conditions, therefore, the property is not appropriate for recreational walking.

Despite the best efforts of the Parks Department, the path may be closed under the conditions outlined below.

Under these circumstances, the "Path Closed" sign will be posted at the entrances to the park's parking lots and entrances to the recreation path. The "Path Open" sign will be posted only when the path is completely clear of snow and/or ice, and weather conditions are not expected to deteriorate to the point that the path becomes hazardous. The signs will be visible from the roadway (Route 11) so you will not have to get out of your car to know the status of the path.

PLEASE PAY ATTENTION TO THE SIGNS – DO NOT USE THE PATH WHEN IT IS CLOSED, AND KEEP IN MIND THAT IF YOU CHOOSE TO USE THE RECREATION PATH, YOU DO SO AT YOUR OWN RISK.

Current Youth Programs: Basketball: The seasons for girls and boys in grades 5 & 6 are underway. Practices are mid-week and games will

be played on Saturdays in January and February. **Volleyball:** This program is for girls in grades 3-6. The program is conducted on Wednesday evenings, 7-8:30 p.m. at the Grimshaw Elementary School's gymnasium and will run through January 31.

Wrestling: For boys and girls grades K-6. Practices for Grades K-3 are Wednesdays and Fridays, 5:15-6:30 p.m. Practices for grades 4-6 are Mondays, 6-8 p.m., and Wednesdays and Fridays, 6:30-8 p.m. Practices are held in the wrestling room at the LaFayette Jr./Sr. High School, which is located in the school's basement. There will not be any practices during school break in February. Matches will be held on Saturday mornings; the coach will provide schedule.

The season runs through mid-March.

Registration and first practice will be on Wednesday, January 3, 2018 at the respective practice times (grades K-3: 5:15 p.m.; grades 4-6: 6 p.m.).
Registration fee is \$5.

Upcoming Youth Sports:

Basketball: The basketball program for girls and boys in grades 3 and 4 will begin after the February school break and run through March. Flyers with starting dates, times and locations will be sent home from school.

Baseball and Lacrosse: Apple Valley League Baseball and Upstate Lacrosse Association sign-ups will be held in early March. Flyers will be coming home from school with details for each respective sport.

As Spring approaches, LCC is in the process of planning the baseball and lacrosse seasons. Coaches are needed at all levels for both of these sports. Please let us know if you are planning to coach this upcoming season; we need to know of your intention

to coach so that we can plan accordingly. Other youth activities:

Skiing: LCC supervised ski nights begin Friday, January 5, 2018; bus transportation and lessons begin on this date.

Bus transportation is available from Grimshaw Elementary School and the LaFayette Jr./Sr. High School or to Song Mountain. The bus will be provided each of the Fridays that lessons provided with ski passes are scheduled (see dates below). The cost for the transportation is \$10, whether riding for the entire six weeks or for just a few weeks. Riders must register and make payment prior to riding the bus. Six lessons are included with most of the ski packages offered by Song Mountain. The lessons will be held January 5, 12, 19, and February 2, 9, 16; bus transportation will be provided on these dates. Please note that there will not be any lessons on Friday, January 26 due to Song Mountain's Friday Freak Out, however, bus transportation will be provided. In the event that a group misses a scheduled lesson during the program, make-up lessons will be conducted on March 2, but no bus transportation will be provided.

Adult Programs:

Daytime/Senior Exercise: Classes are held Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, 8:30 – 9:30 a.m., at the LaFayette Community Center. The next session, a three week mini-session, begins January 23 and runs through February 8. The cost for this mini-session is \$18 (less than \$3/class). Subsequent sessions are: February 14 – March 23 and March 28 – May 4. The cost for the regular 6-week sessions is \$36. Walk-in fee is \$4 per class

Yoga: Classes are held Mondays and Wednesdays, 6:30-7:45 p.m. at the Grimshaw Elementary School. The next session begins January 8, 2018 and runs through June 20, 2018; costs for this session are \$75 (approximately \$3/class) if attending classes one night per week, and \$140 if attending classes two days per week. Walk in fee is \$4 per class.

WERQ® (This class replaces Zumba and Tabata):

WERQ® is a dance fitness class that tightens and tones the entire body through athletic moves and dance steps choreographed to dance, pop and hip-hop music. Classes are held Mondays and Thursdays, 6:30-7:30 p.m. in the Grimshaw Elementary School cafeteria. The next session will begin January 8, 2018 and runs through April 19, 2018; costs for this session are \$42 if attending class one evening per week, Monday or Thursday, and \$80 if attending classes both Monday and Thursday evenings per week. Walk in fee is \$4 per class.

Tai Chi: Beginner and advance classes are held at the LaFayette Community Center on Monday mornings 8:30-11 a.m. Call instructor Lynn Perrine at 315-677-8114 for details.

Men's Basketball: Monday evenings, 7-9 p.m. in the Grimshaw Elementary School gymnasium. Program runs through March 2018. Participants must sign a waiver, which are available on line or at each session. The cost for this program is \$20 for the entire session or \$5 per week walk-in fee.

Other Programs:

Hall Walking: Don't let the weather keep you from getting some exercise during the winter months; the hallways of Grimshaw Elementary School are available for walking weekday evenings from 6-8 p.m., through April. Please use the gymnasium entrance and bring dry footwear to wear while walking the halls. A note book will be provided in the gymnasium foyer for sign-in.

Walking – The recreation path at Stafford Park is also available, every day, dawn to dusk. During the winter, only the south section of the path will be maintained for walkers. Signage will be posted to indicate whether or not the path is open.

Community Council Meetings: Board meetings are scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on the first Thursday of each month. Dates of upcoming board meetings are: January 4, February 1 and March 1. All are welcome and encouraged to attend as we need your help and input. According to the Onondaga County Aging Services, 1 out of 3 people over the age of 65 fall each year and 1 of 10 of those falls result in hospitalization, making falls the leading cause of injury, deaths, hospitalizations, and emergency department visits among adults 65 and older. "Step Up To Stop Falls" is a falls prevention program designed to raise awareness about falls and how to prevent fall-related injuries among older adults and includes an exercise class designed to improve strength and balance. LCC is working with Yoga instructor Kate Farrar on plans to offer this program here in LaFayette beginning in early 2018. Additional information will follow.

LaFayette Outdoors - Wintertime Outdoor Survival



ong before old man winter shows up on our doorsteps ready to greet us with a can go from a fun time to a life and death situation rather quickly if one is not careful.

Back in the early 80's before gortex, thinsulate, and high tech clothing, I remember

hunting in single digits in 100% cotton "thermal"

long johns and freezing 'to death.' I would sweat on the way to the tree stand and within 10 minutes I could start to feel the bitter cold penetrate my weak winter weather armor. Those old long johns were pretty cutting edge and way ahead of their time because they were breathable...the wind cut right through them! Fortunately, the

garment designs and fabrics allow us to enjoy winter fun without being uncomfortable doing so.

How do I dress for the elements? Layers, layers and more layers... Layering advice can be specific to the activity you are planning to do. For high energy activities such as snowshoeing, hiking, cross country and downhill skiing, etc., you should layer with breathable and moisture wicking material such as polypropylene. Many garments such as Under Armor and Nike Pro work well for these types of outdoor adventures. Products made from Merino wool are excellent

for this as well. A

mid layer of fleece, merino wool or down, followed by a wind resistant outer coat will do well to ward off winter's bite.

For more stationary activities such as ice fishing or stand hunting you are better off with many layers which include the polypropylene base with wool layers over top. There are products available that have a windstopper barrier built in to the garment. These are excellent for providing warmth and protection from the wind.

Here are the items to carry for outdoor winter time activities:

- Hot Beverage/Water
- **Healthy Snacks**
- Blanket-heat reflective type
- Hand Warmers
- Cell Phone
- Multi-purpose tool

Signs of Hypothermia:

- **Shivering**
- Slurred speech or mumbling
- Slow, shallow breathing
- Weak pulse
- · Clumsiness or lack of coordination
- **Drowsiness or very low** energy
- Confusion or memory loss
- Loss of consciousness

Good boots with insulation ratings appropriate for the activity and expected temperatures are a must. Of course, a good hat and gloves will help make your activities more enjoyable.

If you are willing and able, get out and enjoy our parks, ski areas, frozen lakes and don't forget to layer up! Enjoy,
