From the Town Supervisor:

I 'm wishing you a Happy New Year behalf of the Town Board! During the past year, Your Town



Board has tackled a dynamic agenda focused on improving five major areas within our Town. You may recall in the January 2014 newsletter that we pledged to communicate more often, lay out an outline for the year ahead, and to bring you current updates and information.

This newsletter will again do the same and we will also add a progress chart for each area to demonstrate to you where I think we stand with each area. This is our Progress Chart for you: our Primary Customer!



Revitalize the Hamlet: Our Primary Focus –

Through dialogue with the New York State Region Three Department we made progress with the Hamlet Road Project. The road within the Hamlet area was repaved this past September with the goal of providing a 3 – 5 year fix to the current road conditions. We will remain engaged on this with the goal of reaching a 100% solution when considering traffic volume, storm water flow, addition of a turn lane, and the remainder of the original plan being adapted to future use.

We have made a small amount of progress in the Hamlet with the focus on a beautification effort. Banners citing our Welcome to those who travel through our Crossroads along with the

new seasonal banners add a feature of Pride and Welcome but, we still need your ideas and help to further this cause. Please take a moment and submit your ideas to us.

We are also beginning the process of defining what the Old Highway Building property could be utilized for. More to come on this in the very near future.

Build a 21st Century Town Highway Department building:



This project is progressing along our contractual timelines. The goal is to be using this new facility in the next 10 weeks. Work will continue through the spring to complete 100% of the project

to include landscaping. There will be a dedication ceremony in late spring for you to attend. *Check the Town Highway and Town face book pages for updates.*

Thank you, Our Tax Payers for providing this new facility to our Highway Team!

Manage cost: Creating Revenue Generators:



The Town Board has entered into a lease of the Town's cell tower on Groth Road to Crescendo Capital Trust, LLC and thus has received a \$617,000 influx of capital into the Town's holdings. This amount coupled with the former county sales tax total of \$218,000 ensures that we can continue to add funds into a tax stabilization budget line for greater than the envisioned 10 year expectancy. The Town Board will tackle the issue of building budget priorities for the use of the largest portion of the cell tower funds in the first quarter of 2015.

We are also engaging on the use of Solar Generated power for the Town facilities that would come at no cost to the Town and this would also generate revenue for the Town.

More to come on these two areas in the March 2015 newsletter.

Grow Business in the Hamlet:



NYS DOT Region Three approved the Byrne Dairy dual entrance – exit plan in late November 2014.

Their recommendation was sent to NYS DOT – Albany for review and comment. I would hope to hear back in early 2015 on their disposition of this matter.

Improve Parks:



Stafford Park received its final top coat of emulsion free paving in October 2014, the adult fitness work stations should be installed in the spring of 2015, and the Beach renovation is nearing completion. A great amount of cleanup work was completed at Marion Bailey Park and we will continue to whittle down the priorities that were established by the local residents. *Great* work on this by Dave Prince! It's been a busy 2014 and we will continue to work on the areas discussed above along with involving you in the decisions on solar power, the

next use of the old highway building property, and improvements in our Town. We've continued to communicate more often last year by increasing our newsletter to bi-monthly. With that comes an increase in cost due to an increased cost in postage. We will introduce an initiative to reduce cost by offering the newsletter electronically in late 2015. The Town has also created a Face Book page to put out newsworthy items and updates for you and to also build our LaFayette Brand. This is still in an infancy stage. Chris Camden our new Social Media consultant is guiding us in building our foundation to communicate with you at a moments notice.

DOG LICENSING—Thank you to everyone who licensed their dogs during the 2014 Dog Enumeration. The enumeration resulted in approximately 130 new dog licenses in our town. The fees have increased for 2015; \$8.00 for spay/neutered dogs and \$20.00 for unsprayed/ unneutered dogs. Licenses may be obtained for 1,2 or 3 years depending on the expiration of the rabies vaccines. You may pay with check or cash via mail or in person. Forms for new licenses may be downloaded from our website. It is New York State Law that all dogs must be licensed in the municipality which they reside.

e are expanding our Lego Mindstorms collection and getting some programming off the ground to




learn and/or use our materials. We are also investing in "littlebits" which are sets of electronic modules

Paying thirteen hundred dollars a year in taxes in addition to utility bills was proving to be very difficult. Coming up with five members to constitute a meeting was always uncertain. So the lodge decided to put their property up for sale.

Then an almost unbelievable thing happened. For quite some time Brother Jim Moltion has been putting information on his website about Odd Fellowship. Two young men in Syracuse caught a look at it and asked to visit the lodge. An open meeting was declared to which they came followed by some of their friends and acquaintances. The result has been a miracle for Uncas Lodge, named after the Indian chief who was the "Last of the Mohicans". All of the new members are in their 20's and 30's and their enthusiasm is contagiously exciting. They are fascinated by the symbols, rituals and traditions of Odd Fellowship which they are eager to embrace.

Most fraternities and service organizations get caught in a "Catch 22" these days. They do less and less because they don't attract members and they can't attract members as they are not active. Due to the work of its new members the brothers of Uncas Lodge were able to give a \$1,000 scholarship to a graduating LaFayette senior this year, Halee Beebe, and other contributions to a couple of worthy charities. In April they presented me with a beautifully engraved pocket watch upon the 40th anniversary of my membership.

About a year ago the Syracuse Rebeckah Lodge began meeting in the building on alternate Thursday evenings. They too are feeling a resuscitation of interest and have taken in a number of young women members. These events have restored confidence in the notion that fraternal and service organizations need not decline to extinction.

Lafayette outdoors BUILDING ESCAPE COVER FOR YOUR BIRD FEEDERS

re your bird feeders located in the open, without brushy cover nearby to help your birds escape from a marauding hawk? The result may be a happy hawk feeding on one of your feathered "pets". This can get out-of-hand when visiting sharp-shinned or Cooper's hawks who learn to return regularly for easy meals.

I learned about brushy escape

cover the hard way. Years ago, a covey of eight bobwhite quail



regularly visited our winter bird feeding station in southern Michigan. These bobwhites were always a thrill to watch, partly because they were rare in that northernmost corner of their range. One snowy Sunday morning we happened to be watching when a sharp-shinned hawk flashed from a nearby aspen like a brown thunderbolt towards the quail covey. Seven quail scattered but one was secure in the hawk's talons. My reaction was slow and less than rational - I rushed out too late to save the quail, but also deprived the hawk of its meal as it fled. This hawk showed up regularly at our feeder during the next week and piles of quail feathers on four more occasions were testimony to its success. The three remaining bobwhites vanished one week later after a particularly severe cold snap. Perhaps they lacked the critical mass of bodies they needed to keep warm as they bunched up in their covey during the long winter nights.

We felt guilty luring these birds to their death around our feeders. Like most feeding stations ours was placed in the open area, watchable from the living room window. The solution was obvious – to "plant" some dense brush strategically around the feeder. I pounded several light metal fence posts (available at most hardware stores) into the ground in a staggered semicircle, with an opening towards the house. I tied deciduous shrubs cut from our back-forty to the fence posts with twine. Some discarded Christmas trees filled out the background. The result was magical. The birds dove into the shrub cover and conifers whenever a hawk appeared, and predation dropped sharply. At home in Lafayette today, growing Spirea and Honeysuckle shrubs near our feeders, serve as good cover, augmented by used Christmas trees set up after the holiday season. Try this – You may be pleasantly surprised, as it may also increase the variety of your visiting birds!

FROM THE PARKS DEPARTMENT Walking trails

n an effort to provide town opportunities for outdoor recreation, the town's Parks Department will attempt to clear and maintain a section of the recreation path at Stafford Park.

Because of the length of the recreation path, it is not feasible to clear and maintain the entire recreation path. Therefore, beginning in January, only the south segment – the section of the recreation path that encircles the playing fields near the concession stand - will be cleared and maintained. This segment of the recreation path can be accessed from the park entrance and parking lot closest to the new Highway Garage construction site.

While only the south segment will be cleared and maintained on a regular basis, weather conditions may allow for other sections of the recreation path to be opened from time-totime. However, due to the slope of the segment of the path connecting the south segment to the central segment (near the tennis courts), it will be closed for

the entire winter. Also, the path may be closed periodically for maintenance.

Given the characteristics of the winters here in LaFayette, it isn't possible to keep the recreation path free of ice and snow every day during the winter. On days that the condition of the recreation path is deemed to be too hazardous, it will be closed.

Each morning during the winter, a representative of the Parks Department will inspect the recreation path to determine whether it will be open or closed for the day. This determination will be made by 9 a.m. In the event of weather changes after 9 a.m., the condition of the path can be reassessed.

The open/closed status of the recreation path will be communicated to potential

signage at the park and through social media. Signs indicating Closed whether the path is open or

closed will be posted at the entrance to Stafford Park's three parking areas; the signs will be

Walking in a Winter Wonderland visible from the roadway (Route 11) so you will not have to get out of your car to know the status of the path. Signs will also be posted at the entrances to the recreation path from the parking

areas. Social media that will be used include the Town's Facebook and Twitter accounts, and, if possible, the Town's web



page. If you are interested in receiving status updates regarding the recreation path, subscribe to the Town's Facebook and/or Twitter accounts for notifications.

Despite the best efforts of the Parks Department, and due to changing weather conditions, snow and ice may be present on the recreation path. Please keep in mind that if you choose to use the recreation path, you do so at your own risk. PLEASE OBSERVE THE SIGNS - DO NOT USE THE PATH WHEN IT IS CLOSED.

Have a safe and healthy winter.

STATE OF THE LAFAYETTE PARKS DEPARTMENT

¹he LaFayette Parks Department is responsible for maintaining the following areas of the town: Stafford Park; Bailey Park; LaFayette Beach; the ball fields behind the LaFayette Inn, and the lawns at the Highway Garage, Odd Fellows and Community Center. In addition, the Parks Department mows the playing fields at the Apple Festival Grounds (TOOLON) for the benefit of the lacrosse program run in conjunction with LaFayette Community Council (LCC). Maintenance of these properties consists of regular mowing, weed whacking, trimming vegetation, picking up fallen limbs, litter pick-up and garbage collection.

LaFayette's parks and green spaces are vibrant and healthy and receive a lot of use. From LCC to civic groups, independent teams and the general public, the parks are used for baseball, softball, lacrosse, Frisbee golf, tennis, volleyball, soccer, swimming, flag football, basketball, movies, horse shoes, picnics and parties. And there is always somebody using the recreation path and playgrounds.

Improvements at Stafford Park during the past year include a new top coat on the recreation path and installation of "doggie clean-up" stations at each of the three main areas of the park. At Bailey Park, overgrown areas at the edge of the basketball court were trimmed back. Projects at LaFayette Beach include the installation of a portable cement bounce-back wall for practicing lacrosse or baseball and resurfacing of the basketball court and installation of new baskets in 2013, and this past fall, construction of a new bathroom facility was begun and will be completed in early 2015.

After making some minor purchases of power equipment, the Parks Department is adequately equipped to maintain the parks. In addition, a part-time helper, hired for spring and summer months, helped to keep the parks in good condition.

The Parks Department has several projects slated for 2015, including the replacement of trash and recycling receptacles, and adding picnic tables, benches and grills at Stafford, Bailey and LaFayette Beach parks. In addition, it will work to recondition the sand and remove the weeds in the volleyball court, repair fencing and backstops, and make landscaping improvements to various areas of the parks.

Long term goals for the parks include resurfacing the tennis/ basketball court at Stafford Park, resurfacing of the basketball court and repair of the baskets at Bailey Park, repair of the "box," guard shack and pavilion floor and improvements to the swimming area at LaFayette Beach, and improvement of the parks' parking areas. Also, the beach could use additional playground equipment to complement the swing set and sand box located there.

At this time, the Parks Department is adequately equipped. However, some of the equipment is older and used vigorously, thus requiring intermittent repairs. Over time, it will not be practical or feasible to repair the equipment and it will need to be replaced. Also, facilities for storing the equipment are maxed out, and additional storage may be needed in the future.

The Town's parks can be considered the "face" of LaFayette - they are the town facilities that are most often seen or used by town residents and so many people visiting or passing through our town, as evidenced by the amount of use they receive. The Parks Department takes great pride in keeping LaFayette's parks and green spaces looking nice and groomed. The grass is regularly mowed, the weeds trimmed and the parks are kept free of litter and debris. The Department looks forward to continuing this practice and making improvements to the parks in order to ensure that every visit to one of our parks is an enjoyable experience.

FROM THE APPLE FESTIVAL COMMITTEE

I would like to take this opportunity, on the behalf of the Board of Directors, to update the community on the 42nd Annual Apple Festival.

We were blessed with favorable weather and solid attendance. All indications are that the food vendors and crafters all had a very good year.

The Apple Festival Board of Directors takes great pride in our support of local businesses and not for profit organizations. Although there has been significant pressure to change our policy, we continue to allow only local, not for profit groups, to sell food at the Apple Festival. We feel strongly that the Apple Festival should continue to be a significant fundraising opportunity for local groups so that they don't have to host as many smaller events throughout the year.

Each year the Festival donates to several local civic organizations. These donations are sometimes for volunteer service, events we sponsor or assisting with a special project of that organization. So far in 2014 the donations total \$25,692.00! This year the Festival has donated to the following organizations:

We are occasionally asked how much it costs to host the Apple Festival. In 1973 it cost \$3,714.20 to put on the Apple Festival. Today it costs over \$200,000.00 each year. In addition to the donations above, some of our major expenses include \$42,000.00 for rent of tents, portable bathrooms, and equipment; \$15,000.00 in property taxes; \$2,500.00 for emergency services; \$22,000.00 in insurance, \$5,000.00 for printing signs, flyers, passes, etc.; \$11,000.00 in electricity; and \$5,000.00 for fuel. After the above expenses the balance of our budget is spent each year on upkeep, maintenance and improvement of the buildings and grounds.

The Festival is not sponsored by any entity nor do we receive any funding or support from Federal, State or Local governments. The total sum of Festival financial responsibilities is met solely from the revenue generated from the two day event and the rent we receive from the house on the property, storage income for cars and boats, and facility rental fees from weddings, graduation parties, fundraisers, etc.

Since 1973, the Board of Directors has had three main goals: to promote LaFayette; to support our local civic organizations and; to provide financial security for future festivals. The Apple Festival is proof of what great things can be accomplished when a community joins together and works toward a common goal.

FROM YOUR EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

ur committee recently began a review and a complete rewrite of the town's emergency action plan. This is long overdue and will incorporate information from Federal, State and County Plans.

The goal is to modernize our plan while focusing on the immediate support that the Town's resources can provide during the first 48 hours of a large scale emergency.

Doug Daniel, myself and Kelly Green are leading this effort and our timeline includes completing it by February 2015. Mrs. Green is an experienced engineer and public official who moved to LaFayette from Cape Girardeau, MO and owns a consulting firm specializing in this work.

As you well know, one of our greatest long term emergencies in Central New York is a long term power outage that is an outcome of an extreme weather pattern; snowfall, thunderstorms or high winds.

If you require assistance during extreme power outages your first call should be to 911. Please take the time to prepare yourself for



our winter ahead. Plan for a night without power; ask yourself do you have enough provisions and a portable heat source.

We will share with you many of the assets, actions and outcomes this plan will offer the Town throughout the year.

You don't know when disaster may strike. Be prepared for the worst with a Disaster Emergency Kit, one that contains a minimum of 72 hours of food, water and other supplies

Communication checklist

Make sure you have at least one of the following in case there is a power failure:

- Cell phone, portable charger, and extra batteries
- Battery powered radio, with extra batteries, for listening to local emergency instructions
- Listen to emergency broadcasts
- Make a family communication plan. Your family may not be together during and extreme winter event, so it is important to know how you will contact one another, how you will get back together and what you will be doing during an emergency.
- Be sure to check on older neighbors and family members; assist as necessary

Heating checklist

- Turning on the stove for heat is not safe; have at least one of the following heat sources
 - Extra blankets, sleeping bags and warm winter coats
 - Fireplace with plenty of dry firewood or a gas log fireplace
 - Portable space heaters or kerosene heaters
- Use electric space heaters with automatic shut-off switches and non-glowing elements
- Never place a space heater on top of furniture or near water
- Never leave children unattended near a space heater
- Keep heat sources at least 3 feet away from furniture and drapes
- Have the following safety equipment
 - Chemical fire extinguisher
 - Smoke alarm in working order (check prior to winter storm season and change batteries)
 - Carbon monoxide detector (check prior to winter storm season and change batteries)
 - Never use an electric generator indoors, inside the garage, or near the air intake of your home
- Do not use generator or appliances if they are wet
- Do not store gasoline indoors
- Use individual heavy-duty, outdoor rated cords to plus in other appliances

Cooking and Lighting Checklist

- Use battery-powered flashlights or lanterns
- Never use charcoal grills or portable gas camp stoves indoors
- Avoid using candles as they can lead to house fires. If you do never leave then unattended.

Food and Safety Checklist

Have a week's worth of food and safety supplies

- Drinking water
- Canned/no-cook food (bread, crackers, dried fruits)
- Non-electric can-opener
- First aid kit
- Rock salt to melt ice on walkways
- Cat litter of bag of sand to add traction on walkways

Water Checklist

- Leave all taps slightly open so they drip continuously
- Do not thaw pipes with a torch. Thaw pipes slowly with warm air
- Fill the bathtub or have bottled water on hand
