Stay healthy and stay safe LaFayette. I look forward to seeing all of you in person again soon.



Since the Town Hall was and remains closed to the public, the front door will remain locked and all necessary and recommended precautions such as social distancing 6 feet apart, wearing masks and constant sanitizing of hands, pens, etc. and everything involved were used to ensure the safety of the residents and I am continuing those practices until further notice. All services listed below can and will be provided; it just takes a bit more preparation and some patience too, please.

FACILITIES RENTAL – (Please keep in mind the reopening regulations due to Coronavirus). Our two_pavilions book up quickly with graduation parties, family & class reunions, birthday & anniversary parties and even weddings. If you are interested in renting either of the Stafford Park pavilions or the Community Center, I advise you to act quickly to reserve them. The fee for residents is still only \$100.00, non-residents or businesses \$250 plus the \$50.00 deposit.

PASSPORT PROCESSING Applications are available on-line at http://travel.state.gov, or in my office. Please call to schedule an appointment to process passport applications. Renew your passport by mail yourself if your current passport isn't over 5 years expired with five easy steps and form DS-82 at website above.

HANDICAP PERMITS— Applications available here or at your doctor's office.

DOG LICENSING Just a reminder: **ALL DOGS MUST BE LICENSED.** You have the option of licensing your dog for one to three years now. The cost per year is \$8.00 for spayed and neutered dogs and \$20.00 for unsprayed and unneutered dogs. When doing a multiple year license, the license expiration date must be before the expiration date of the rabies vaccination. Replacement tag fee: \$3.00; Impoundment fee: \$150.00. Please be responsible for your pets.

2020 RABIES SHOT CLINICS/ONONDAGA COUNTY HEALTH DEPT have been cancelled due to COVID-

If you see any suspicious/strange acting animals (possible rabies) please contact the Department of Environmental Conservation Police at (315) 426-7431.

SHREDDING/RESCUE MISSION DROP OFF/ MEDICATION DISPOSAL/TORN OR TATTERED FLAGS DROP OFF

August 8th from 9am-12pm LaFayette Town Hall This free SHREDDING service to residents,



including businesses. Bring your personal paperwork, business files, tax returns, statements & bills, etc. to the **Town Hall upper parking lot**. Watch your papers be shredded on site, via a

video camera attached to the shredding truck. It is

then locked and taken a waste management site for recycling. This saves you time and saves our environment and gives you piece of mind that your personal documents are secure.

After dropping off your shredding come inside the



Town Hall Lobby for **MEDICATION DISPOSAL** to safely get rid of your unwanted and *expired* drugs or *medications*. 7 out of 10 people who abuse prescription drugs get them from

friends or relatives, so let's avoid this happening in our homes. With all of the prescription drug abuse we hear of, let's get them disposed of properly for the safety of our kids, families and environment.

NO SHARPS PLEASE!

This has been a huge success the past few years so we may have a **RESCUE MISSION DROP OFF** (not confirmed yet) along with the shredding and medication disposal. Keep an eye on social media for confirmation. You may drop off everything from small furniture, blankets, clothes, shoes, linens, etc. for Rescue Mission at the Town Hall. One man's junk is another man's treasure, right? While you are spring cleaning & cleaning out closets, instead of taking it to the landfill site, drop them off at the Town Hall. Please be sure things are clean and in good condition. (No pillows, mattresses, car seats, TV's or junk please).

Also, **TORN OR TATTERED FLAGS DROP OFF**—For proper disposal of your torn or tattered American Flags, please drop them off at the Town Hall for the WATCH FIRE flag burning ceremony @ Community Day

From the Information Officer



That was the motto of our Town Government during the shutdown due to COVID-19. If you were in need of town business services, you would be surprised to know that the LaFayette Town Offices were one of the few in the County that were open during normal business hours

and handled most town business without interruption via curbside or online service.

Jackie Roorda, our Town Clerk came to work everyday and solely performed all clerk duties. She provided Marriage Licenses, Notary Services, Fishing/hunting licenses amongst other duties not only for the Town of LaFayette but for other municipalities such as Tully, Fabius, Liverpool, Syracuse and even someone from PA that is getting married in Memphis, NY. These offices may have been closed, working reduced hours or were working remotely. She even found the time to perform two wedding ceremonies during a pandemic.

Our Town Supervisor along with County Legislator Dave Knapp were diligent in keeping residents abreast of all things COVID. They hosted a "MUST SEE" weekly briefing via Facebook Live, socially distant at 6', that allowed residents to ask questions. No question went unanswered. They kept everyone informed of events either postponed, cancelled or being planned. They were instrumental in organizing a virtual Memorial Day celebration along with Bill McConnell, the VFW and The Fire Department after the physical parade was called off. A pandemic shutdown was not going to cause our veterans to be forgotten in LaFayette.

Supervisor Fitzpatrick participated in food deliveries, distributed masks and worked with local businesses on compliance. Arlington Acres Drive-in movie night and

helping to get the LaFayette Motor Sports park open without spectators in Phase 1 to mention a few. Town Board meetings were held via Zoom and after a brief delay Planning and Zoning Meetings were added.

County Legislator Dave Knapp helped organize Milk, Egg, Face Mask and Yogurt free giveaways. He also worked to secure hand sanitizer and masks that were given to small farms and roadside stands who sell directly to the public for everyone's protection.

Also, in the middle of the pandemic, the LaFayette Business Network was resurrected with meetings held via Zoom as a means for our small businesses to network through tough times. This endeavor was co-led by Bill McConnell, Town Board member and Town Supervisor, Danny Fitzpatrick. I also need to shout out to our *Highway Department* who managed to keep our roads clear for our essential workers during our wintry Spring. From the Highway Department



Greetings residents. I truly hope that everyone is getting back to normal. These are unique and unprecedented times. These are also challenging times for the Highway Department. During the Covid –19 pandemic the Highway Department continued to serve the residents. Brush pick-up took over a month and is now completed. Road sweeping operations are 80% complete. Annual Town Clean-up days, (Normally the first weekend in May); had to be postponed until August 1st because of the Governor's "mass gathering" order. "E" waste

can be dropped off at the Groth Road Town Transfer site, however, only **2 TV's per household** will be allowed. Residents will also be allowed to bring unwanted sticks and small piles of brush to the transfer site. Free mulch is currently available at the Highway

Garage and will be available at the Transfer Site August 1st.

Road work and Mowing operations will continue this summer. We are slightly behind, so please be patient. We apologize for any inconveniences to our residents and will strive to serve everyone in a timely manor. Any questions, feel free to contact me at (315) 677-9535.


Due to the Covid-19 protocols, the LaFayette Town Court is closed until further notice. We do not have a confirmed date as to when we will reopen to the public.

From the LaFayette Public Library



As many of you know, as of June 1st, the LaFayette Public Library reopened for **curbside pickup (only)**. Here is how it works:

Returning items: * As things come into the library via the book-drop, they will be quarantined for 7 days before they are checked in. At that time, the check in date will be backdated to when they were put into the book-drop, so it looks they were returned on the drop off date. This way both the staff and the patrons can rest assured that the items that are being handled for check out or put into delivery to other libraries are safe from contamination.



*PLEASE NOTE: we will not take any items from you at this time. If you have items to return, please place them in the book drop. As mentioned above, we have a separate procedure to safely remove items from the book drop to put them into quarantine.

Placing holds

You can place holds (reserve an item) as you normally would: either online or by calling us -315-677-3782 (see hours below)

Picking up items

Once things are checked in after the quarantine period, hold notifications will go out (via phone, email and/or text). If you are notified that something is here for pickup, or if you would like something to be put aside for pickup, please contact us to make arrangements at 315-677-3782. Here are the times we will be taking calls to arrange pick up (Note: hours are for you to call to arrange pickup times):

Monday & Tuesday – 10 – 6:30

Wednesday -10-4:30

Thursday -12 - 6:30

Friday 10 – 4:30

Curbside pick up

At this point, you will have notified us

to arrange pickup. At the designated time, we will check the items out and bring them to you. We ask that you either roll down a rear window or pop the trunk to minimize staff contact with door handles, etc. Thank you for your cooperation!

As of this writing, we ae developing how we are going to deal with Summer Reading Program registrations, logs etc. There will be no live performances (again – as of now) but we are working on how to get performances to you virtually and there is a Summer Reading Program!

The LaFayette Community Council (LCC) is a volunteer organization that functions under the

auspices of the Town of LaFayette government. Its goal is to promote the well-being and happiness of the residents of the town of LaFayette by providing a wide variety of recreational and leisure activities intended to enhance the physical, social and cultural welfare of residents of all ages.

LCC is composed of members of the LaFayette community, including: A Board of Directors consisting of a President, a Vice-President, a Treasurer, and a Secretary; Voting Members; Coaches; Instructors, and other volunteers. In addition, there is a clerk that takes care of the day-to-day operations.

Current Programs Offered:

Youth programs - basketball; wrestling; volleyball, baseball/softball/t-ball; lacrosse; soccer; swim lessons; and soccer and tennis camps during the summer

Adult Programs - senior exercise; yoga; aerobics; men's basketball, and co-sponsor of "Step UP to Stop Falls" classes

Other programs and activities - ski club; hall walking; Community Day; Apple Festival; the annual tree lighting and movie nights. LCC is also a supporter of the high school's musical production, and its Rock Festival, Grimshaw's Parade of Baskets, the After-Prom program and sponsors an annual scholarship for graduating seniors.

For LCC to maintain the quality of the programs it offers, we need dedicated and energetic people – LIKE <u>YOU!</u>



New members are needed; LCC needs new members so that we can continue our current programs, and your ideas and input so that we can expand the array of programs we offer. Also, all current members of the board of directors will be stepping down as of December 31, 2020 and need to be replaced. Please consider taking on a Board position. Ideally, these positions need to be filled as soon as possible to assure a smooth transition — current board members will be available to direct the new board members through the end of the year. In addition, the recreation clerk will be available to the new Board to assure continuity of programs.

COVID UPDATE

As New York state emerges from being on pause, recreational activities are expected to be allowed to resume in phase IV, which should be sometime around July 1. In anticipation of this, LCC is working on plans for our spring and summer programs, with some modifications to comply with restrictions established by the state. LCC also hopes to resume the two winter programs, grades 2-4 basketball and volleyball, that were interrupted. Information regarding all LCC programs will be published on the Town's Web Site – refer to the LCC tab, as well as through the Town's social media outlets, Facebook, and Twitter. —Dave Prince

Conservation Subdivision Design (CSD)

Under "Open Space" in LaFayette's Comprehensive Plan Action Matrix, Goal #7B, this Short Term action is listed: "7B. Utilize Conservation Subdivision Design to protect steep slopes, scenic views, farmland, wetlands, floodplains, and other unique or significant natural features."

Here's how our town can benefit from Conservation Subdivisions. Landowners used to only have two choices - either continue to own their land and conserve it, or sell it for traditional development methods.

Full Equity

Conservation subdivisions preserve the rural character of a community, protect wildlife, water quality, reduce flooding and conserve important rural and agricultural economies.

Homeowners' time spent mowing lawns and on other outdoor maintenance is reduced, freeing them to enjoy the many acres of open space. This does not mean that homeowners have to live on a small lot. Many conservation subdivisions lot sizes in rural areas are an acre or more.

Same Number of Homes, More Profitable, and Good for the Economy

The same number of homes can be built as allowed in conventional "cookie-cutter" subdivisions. Conservation subdivisions are proven more profitable, less costly and faster selling than conventional subdivisions. They enhance the property values of nearby parcels and neighboring properties. Study results show that lots in conservation subdivisions carry a premium, are less expensive to build, and sell more quickly than lots in conventional subdivisions making them more profitable to developers than conventional subdivisions. Homes in the conservation subdivision sold in about half the time, on average for \$17,000 (13%) more than homes in the conventional subdivision where lots were twice as large.
