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As anticipated, the 2017 budget has been a significant challenge. The tax cap as mandated by New York State is just about a half

of one percent (.067). If we exceed the tax cap all taxpayers within LaFayette will not receive their tax rebate checks. This has forced us to make some of the following budget cuts, none of them was easy but all are necessary.

The Town Newsletter We will transition from 6 editions to 4 editions, based on a seasonal model ; Spring-Summer – Fall-Winter.

Elimination of Conferences and travel expenses: All conferences and travel lines were eliminated unless legally mandated for certification or licensing.

Departmental budgets: The Highway Department did allot of work to reduce their annual budget by **10%**. The Fire Department and Library came in at zero percent increase.

Health care costs: A significant contributor to our budget deficit is our employee health care costs. In the last 18 months medical claims



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have spiked \$ 134,000 thousand s dollars over budget. For 2017 the employee contribution rate will change from 1% to 5 % making it a 95% taxpayer funded benefit as stated below:

Monthly Rates: (Based on Current 2016 rates as we do not have the new insurance rates for 2017 rates yet).

Taxpayer Funded Employee Funded

Single:\$ 571.90\$27.78Family:\$1,482.00\$72.00

Employee wages: All employees received zero or a maximum increase of .0067. Town Supervisor and Deputy Supervisor took a 10% pay decrease.

We spent long hours going through every line item to shave off \$50.00 or \$100.00 anything to help achieve our budget goal . We were also able to avoid job eliminations and any reduction in community services. We have achieved our goal, and are proud to present a 2017 Town budget that will be under the tax cap. 

When you come to court you are expected to be dressed in presentable attire. Remove your hats. Turn your cell phones off. A sign in desk with instructions is located upon entry into the court

DID YOU KNOW: Only the court determines the fines, so that is why they are not printed on your ticket. There are guilty and not guilty sections on the ticket to fill out and mail in to us. If you fill out the guilty portion the file will be given to the judge to decide on the fine and a fine notice will be mailed to you. If you fill out the not guilty portion you need to mail in your ticket with your current drivers abstract and a letter as to why you are pleading not guilty. You will be notified by mail of the District Attorneys recommendation. You can obtain your drivers abstract from the Department of Motor Vehicles either on line or in person.






