

From the Town Supervisor

I'm writing to update you on the old LaFayette Hotel activities and **Fable of Contents** outcomes that your Town Board have taken since our last newsletter was delivered on July 2, 2022.

> The Town Board approved by a unanimous vote during the July meeting a decision to apply for a \$304,000 grant through the New York Main Street Stabilization Grant Program. The results of this grant selection process will be released in the October – November 2022 timeframe. This grant could be used to shore up the roof, siding, doors, and windows of the old hotel building if the decision is to move ahead with the restoration of

Community Newsletter

This grant application was completed by Jeanie Gleisner-Earle of the CNY Regional Planning and Development Board and Deputy Supervisor Mark Distler. There was no cost to the Town for their services as they donated their expertise and their time for this. C&S engineering completed the remediation of the soil on the Route 20 and Route 11 boundaries of the old hotel building in early July. These fuel spills date back to over 80 years ago and are located where gas pumps once stood. This 9 month effort included the research, studies, analysis, and the final remediation process. The total cost was \$150,000 and this was paid for with the funds from our Onondaga County Grant, again no cost to the taxpayer.

The Town Board voted down by a margin of a 3-2 vote during the August Town Board meeting to further invest \$5,000 from the Onondaga County Grant to create a Local Development Corporation (LDC). The LDC would be needed to sell the property on behalf of the Town if the Town was unable to find a developer to partner with in the future if the decision was made to redevelop the hotel property and the vacant lot.

Mark Distler and I met with/interviewed three CNY developers during June – August. Hanover Real Estate Development became the strongest potential candidate from the three firms to possibly work with the Town to determine the "highest and best use for the Property". Hanover presented an introductory presentation at the September 13th Town Board meeting and the Town Board voted unanimously for a Special Meeting on September 22. This Special meeting allowed Hanover to provide an in-depth presentation to the Town Board and our residents.

Financials of the Hotel Project

To give a financial background to the funding of the Hotel project we have been tasked to appropriate a \$500,000 *Onondaga County grant* toward restoration or removal of the LaFayette hotel. The total spent is \$126,660.28 to date.

Some funds from the \$492,716.47 ARPA (American Rescue Plan of 2021) were able to be used to purchase the corner hotel and adjacent parcel totaling \$80,715.62.

This leaves us with \$373,339.72 remaining of the County monies to continue either restoring or turning the southeast corner of our hamlet into a park.

The current and proposed grant applications are for the building's exterior work (including structural and HVAC). The interior work would require further investment and a proposal to analyze the feasibility for —Carole Dwyer

If you are out of Onondaga county on election day, or if you are permanently or temporarily disabled, ill or are the primary care giver for one or more people who are ill or physically disabled, or a resident of a Veterans Hospital, or detained in jail awaiting Grand Jury action or incarcerated for an offense other than a felony you may apply for an absentee ballot.

Polls are open 6:00 a.m. – 9:00 p.m.

Voter registration forms are available at the Town Clerk's office and the Post Office and online at www.ongov.net/elections or call the Board of Elections (315) 435-3322 with any questions. If you wish to vote in the upcoming election, you must mail or deliver this form to the Onondaga County Board of Elections no later than 25 days before the election in which you want to vote. This means for the November 8th general election, the deadline is October 14, 2022, and address changes by October 19th. If mailing the registration form it must be postmarked by that date. The deadline for absentee ballot applications is October 24th. You must be 18 years old by the date of the general, primary or other election in which you want to vote. If you move, but remain in the same county, send your change of address to the Board of Elections so that your records may be updated. If you have not notified the board of your change of address, you may vote on a paper ballot (everyone votes on a paper ballot these days) and have your records updated at that time.

DOG LICENSING - The fees are \$8.00 for Spay/Neutered dogs and \$20.00 for Unspayed/Unneutered dogs. Licenses may be obtained for 1, 2, or 3 years depending on the expiration of the rabies vaccines. You may pay with check or cash, via mail or in person. Forms for new licenses may be downloaded from our website. It is New York State Law that all dogs must be licensed in the municipality which they reside. Please contact Dog Control Officers; Ken Johnson (315) 263-1000; Deputy Dog Control Officer Laura Holt (315) 696-6468 for any stray/lost dogs.

DOG IDENTIFICATION – I strongly suggest that you put your contact information such as your phone

number on your pets. If your dog gets found after hours or on weekends, the dog control officer would contact you directly and avoid your dog/cat going to the SPCA and a \$150.00 fine. Most pet stores sell tags that you can engrave what you choose for your pet.

School is back in session......motorists please be aware of school children and buses. Slow down and pay attention!! No passing a stopped school bus on the

right. State law states that traffic from either direction approaching a stopped school bus with flashing red lights must stop before reaching the bus. Drivers should stop their vehicles at least 20 feet from the bus. You must stop whether you are approaching a bus from the front or from the rear, even on a divided or multi-lane highway. Fines start at a minimum of \$250 to a maximum of \$400, plus state surcharges for a first offense.

From the LaFayette Highway Superintendent



As we move out of summer and transition into fall, I would like to thank all our residents for their patience while our Highway employees completed work on our Town roads this summer. Our department is still ditching, mowing and completing some small projects on our town roads.

Our fall brush pick-up is completed for this year. Please take note for the spring pick-up, that your brush piles need to be stacked along the edge of the road and please no longer

than 8'. This service is intended for fallen tree limbs and minor tree trimming "NOT" major tree removal and property clearing. If you have a tree removed by a contractor, that contractor is responsible for removal of the debris. Please never hesitate to contact us at 315-677-9535 if you have any questions about this service.

On August 18, 2021, we were faced with a challenge "Tropical Storm Fred". In a 24-hour period we received over 7 inches of rainfall that closed many roads and damaged some of our drainage systems. After a year of long hours and never-ending FEMA paperwork, I have been able to recover monies spent from our roads budget to repair damage received due to the storm. At this time, I have been able to recover over \$33,581 with \$51,419 still pending final approval by FEMA and the State of New York. At this time, I am working with Mark Chambers, Engineer "C&S Engineering" on a FEMA Mitigation Grant. With this process The Town of Lafayette could receive approximately \$180,000 to make improvements to our damaged drainage system.



Lastly, please be mindful of trash can placement for our plow drivers. Enjoy the fall months, stay safe and don't forget about the LaFayette Apple Festival. -Steve Robson **Highway Superintendent**

From the Town Historian—The Hill House

We are fast approaching our town's 200th anniversary. Much has changed in those years. Many of the family names and almost all of the buildings of our original settlers have long disappeared only to be replaced by new names and newer buildings. Our links to the past seem to stay with us only within the pages of our history books. There is however, until just recently, one family name that has ties to the same house since 1810 and the same property since 1795. It is known as the Hill House on Clark Hollow Road.

Our story starts with Ebenezer Hill. After arriving in Clark Hollow from Hoosick Falls, Rensselaer County, N.Y. he selected his site of settlement and bought 147 acres from Abel Owen. In addition, he married Charlotte Owen, who just happened to be Abel Owen's daughter. They had a son named Lewis Owen Hill born in 1795. He was the first white child born in the town to live to maturity and spend his entire life here. In 1810 Ebenezer had a brick house built for him by a master builder named John Woodruff. At the same time John Woodruff built a brick house for Ebenezer's brother-in-law Solomon Owen who was the first settler to arrive in the Hollow in 1793. The bricks for both houses were made on Solomon's land. They are laid in the Flemish Bond style on the front of the house.

As time went on Lewis Hill married Temperance Dixon Hill (1801-1877). He and his wife did not have children .When their nephew, Clayton Hill (born June 18, 1840) was about three years old he was brought to the brick house to be raised by them. In 1866 Clayton Hill married his cousin, Rowena Flavia Hill. Rowena's father, Milo Hill was a doctor in Buffalo and Clayton followed in his uncle's footsteps. Clayton was a surgeon in the 4th New York Artillery during the Civil War. From about 1867 to 1873 he practiced at the brick house and then moved to Buffalo. After his adopted father's death in 1878 the house and the farm passed on to him. He maintained the brick house as his summer home for more than 20 years. He would often treat neighbors and friends when in LaFayette, even delivering twin daughters to George



and Algena Hiscock Everingham on July 22, 1891.

Mrs. Rowena Hill died in 1897 and Dr. Clayton Hill died in 1905. In the spring of 1906 their son, Robert, came to the brick house to live and about 1916 he had a new two-story wing built onto the house replacing the original one. Robert's son, Richard Hill, eventually became the owner of the brick house. In 1959 Richard Hill and his family moved. Since then the family has rented out the house.



Recently the property has been sold, thus breaking the longest link between the family name of one of our earliest settlers and his still standing house. Our best wishes goes out to the new owners.

<u>Invasive Species –harmful non-native plants,</u> <u>insects and more</u>

Invasive species are organisms that when introduced outside their native range, harm ecosystems, the economy, and/or human health. There are hundreds of impactful invasive species in NYS, and these contribute to habitat degradation, loss of native species, loss of recreational income, crop damage, risks to public safety and more.

One great way to get involved is to become a data collector using iMapInvasives, a mobile-friendly GIS-based data management system that allows you to quickly and easily report information about invasives. To sign up for a free account and explore the iMapInvasives application, visit imapinvasives.natureserve.org.

The Finger Lakes Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management (PRISM) is the place to go to learn about specific and immediate needs for volunteer efforts detecting and controlling invasive species. Learn more at fingerlakesinvasives.org.



So what are some invasives to worry about now? Here are a few examples:

Spotted Lanternfly (SLF) – a new invader in CNY

- Destroys crops and native plants
- · Vandalizes with sooty mold
- Threatens food, beer and wine industries
- Sabotages our local economy

Hemlock Wooly Adelgid (HWA) - This tiny insect is

a big problem for forests and water resources. Hemlocks in NYS lack natural resistance and we have no predators to control HWA. Hemlocks provide wildlife wintering areas by reducing



snow depths and moderating temperatures. Death of hemlock trees would alter forest structure and expose wildlife to harsh winter extremes.

- Damages and eventually kills Hemlocks
- Loss of habitat
- Damages our economy

Poison Hemlock - This common invasive has a

purple blotchy stem and small fern-like leaves and can grow to 10 feet. All parts of Poison Hemlock are highly toxic and can be fatal to humans and animals. Never handle this plant without gloves and other protective clothing including eye wear. Shower afterwards to

be sure you have no



toxic sap on your skin, and launder your clothes.

- Crowds out other vegetation
- Extremely toxic to livestock, pets and humans
- Easily confused with Queen Anne's Lace and other similar plants




