1. Supervisor Scammell called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.
2. The Town Clerk took the Roll. Councilor Bailey absent. All else present.
3. Pledge to our U. S. Flag led by Town Councilor Dave Knapp.
4. **Councilor's Knapp moved and Smith seconded the motion to accept the March 28, 2005, Regular Meeting Minutes as submitted by the Town Clerk. Motion passed unanimously.**
5. **Public Hearings - None.**
6. **COMMUNICATIONS:**

**A. Residents.**

Councilor Knapp said Councilor Bailey is absent tonight because his wife Michele Pirro Bailey's brother Dave Pirro was golfing in Florida on a bright sunny day and all the sudden two clouds came together and he was struck by lightening and was killed on the spot. Councilman Bailey sent his regrets for not being in attendance.

Councilor McConnell said he has received communications from the community. Over the past month he has received 3 calls and gotten 2 letters complaining about the conditions that are being overlooked at by the management and on scene at Festival

Garden Apartments. He submitted the letters to the Board to review. The complainants wish to remain anonymous. He spoke to Kevin Gilligan today and he thinks he will write a letter to Carlyle Smith addressing the concerns and violations. Some of the violations are: motorcycle being ridden up and down the hallway day and night, smoking in the hallways, the promises for new windows made last year which they are now being advised won't take place, etc. He will have the Board review his letter before he sends it.

**B. Office of NYS Comptroller Hevesi: Distribution adjustments of justice fines.**

“On December 15, 2004, the Governor signed A11845/S7757 into law (Chapter 740). This legislation repealed the change in vehicle and traffic fine distribution that had been enacted as part of the 2004 budget bills. With this repeal, the basis of distribution between local governments and the State had been restored to the method in place prior to August 20, 2004.

Tom Chartrand said this is included in the bill tonight.

Councilor Knapp said they never really implemented it.

Tom Chartrand said yes but they kept the fines.

**C. U.S. Army Corps of Engineers: Onondaga Lake Watershed Management Plant, City of Syracuse, Onondaga County, Central New York State & Onondaga Nation.**

Supervisor Scammell said this is their latest plan.

**D. Niagara Mohawk/National Grid: Street lighting & stray voltage testing.**

“The purpose of this letter is to request specific information regarding those street lights and traffic signals in the Town of LaFayette that are owned by the Town of LaFayette (as opposed to those owned by Niagara Mohawk). This inquiry is important in helping the Company comply with electric safety standards adopted by the State of New York Public Service Commission (“PSC”) on January 5, 2005.

In the January 5<sup>th</sup> order adopting the safety standards (“Order”) the PSC required utilities to perform stray voltage testing on all of its potentially conductive street light standards...”

Supervisor Scammell said Leon Cook has advised we don't own any street lights or signal lights. He will fill this paperwork out and send it in.

**E. NYS Assemblyman Jeff Brown: Albany Update.**

“Today is the last day of the state fiscal year, and I'm happy to report that New York will have its first on-time budget in 21 years!

Some said it couldn't be done. This year, the process worked more the way we expect it to. Majority and minority members formed joint...

But before taxpayers allow legislators to bask too long in the glory of self-congratulations, let's take a closer look at the details of this particular budget.

There were some very positive aspects of the budget agreement. The Legislature has agreed to a cap on county Medicaid costs, a proposal designed to help keep local property taxes from growing at unsustainable rates. In addition, we agreed to reauthorize

and reform the Empire Zone program, extend the Power for Jobs Program to help keep jobs in Central New York and begin the process of simplifying the school aid formula.

At the same time, however, this budget raises taxes on every New Yorker to the tune of \$675 million. It authorizes increase state borrowing of \$15 billion, which is in addition to the \$130 billion in debt we already have (2<sup>nd</sup> most in the nation). And it raises spending to an unprecedented \$106.5 billion, more than any other state, except California, which spends \$111 billion, but has twice the population of New York.

My biggest objection to this budget is that these spending decisions we're making today will impact the decisions made by our children and grandchildren tomorrow as to where they live and raise their families. As the founder of the Come Home to Syracuse campaign, I talk to individuals and business leaders frequently who would like nothing more than to return to this community and grow their businesses, sharing the resources of Central New York – the outstanding educational opportunities, cultural and recreational assets, etc. – with their employees and business clients. They are detracted, though, by the high taxes in New York that, they argue, would threaten their growth and jeopardize the company's future..."

**F. Onondaga County Supervisors Association President Bob DeMore: Block Grant program cuts.**

"Attached is a letter that I will be sending to Congressman Walsh regarding the attached article in the Post-Standard. I would suggest that each Town also write a letter to the Congressman voicing support for the Block Grant Program..."

"I recently read the article in the Post Standard regarding your opposition to the proposed cuts in the Federal community Development Block Grant program and on behalf of the nineteen towns in the Onondaga County Supervisors Association, would like to voice our support for your opposition to the proposed cuts.

For a number of years, I've had the pleasure of serving on the advisory board that reviews the various applications from the towns and villages and I've always been impressed by the quality of the projects chose by our local communities for funding under the program.

This program is one way for our local governments to improve their communities without adding an additional burden on our local real property taxpayers.

Again, our association strongly supports your effort to preserve this program..."

Supervisor Scammell said the article stated: "Rep. James Walsh, R-Onondaga, has joined other Republican members of Congress in opposing President Bush's plan for massive cuts to the federal Community Development Block Grant Program..."

Supervisor Scammell asked if the Board was in favor of sending this letter.

Councilor Knapp doesn't think we've gotten anything for quite awhile from this.

Supervisor Scammell said since the funding for the Grange, periodically we may have gotten small amounts.

**Councilor's Knapp moved and Smith seconded the motion to authorize the supervisor to write this letter of support and send it to Congressman Walsh. Motion passed unanimously.**

**G. NYS Senator John DeFrancisco: Public Protection & General Government budget bills.**

“I am pleased to inform you that the Town of LaFayette will see an increase of \$1,137 in funding over last year as a result of the Public Protection and General Government budget bills passed by the Senate yesterday. This will bring the towns total funding level to \$31,452.

My Senate Majority colleagues and I fought for a 3.75 percent aid increase for towns and villages. I hope that this will provide some relief for your municipality and for your constituents.

The bills passed yesterday also include critical funding for law enforcement programs and homeland security that will help to enhance safety in our communities which is important for all Central New Yorkers...”

#### **H. PERMA: Claims statistics.**

Supervisor Scammell said we seem to average about two a year.

Councilor Knapp asked what Outstanding Reserves and Incurred Losses mean.

Tom Chartrand said they are advising they have that amount in reserve for our account.

#### **I. Butler Fence: NYS Labor Department.**

“As you may be aware, due to an unfortunate set of circumstances we were debarred by the New York State Labor Department in 2000.

The debarment period has nearly expired and effective April 26, 2005 we can bid on and perform public work projects...”

#### **J. NYS DEC: SPDES permit mods.**

“The purpose of this correspondence is to notify you of changes to the referenced General State Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (SPDES) permit...”

#### **K. Onondaga County Legislature: 4.5.05 agenda.**

“Authorizing the standardization of the NICE System-Wide Recording System at the Emergency Communications Center for reasons of efficiency and economy.

#### **L. Syracuse Post-Standard, 3.31.05: February job report.**

“The Syracuse area’s unemployment rate dropped to 5.6 percent in February, putting it even with the state’s jobless rate and below the nation’s rate.

The state Labor Department said there were about 2,700 more jobs in Madison, Onondaga and Oswego counties in February than there were in the same month last year. It represented a job growth of slightly less than 1 percent.

‘That’s a very healthy growth rate for the Syracuse area’ said an economist with the Labor Department

All of the job growth came in the private sector, which gained 2,900 jobs. Government employment declined by 200 jobs.

The only business sector to lose jobs was manufacturing, which shrank by 1,000 jobs, or nearly 3 percent of its base. ..

Losses in the manufacturing sector are occurring primarily among companies that make durable goods...

The biggest job gainers were professional and business services (up 1,000), education and health services (up 900) and leisure and hospitality employers (up 900). The trade, transportation and utility sector expanded by 700 jobs...”

**M. Costello, Cooney & Fearon: Supreme Court of the United States, City of Sherrill v Oneida Nation of New York & United States District Court Northern District of New York, The Onondaga Nation v. The State of New York, Onondaga County, City of Syracuse, Honeywell Int’l, Trigen Syracuse Energy, Clark Concrete, Valley Realty & Hanson Aggregates.**

Kevin Gilligan said this is basically a copy of the Sherill decision. It’s good for us in the context of the new claim that was made. There is no way to appeal it because they are at the U.S. Supreme Court. This means good things for us.

**N. Village of East Syracuse Mayor-elect Tony Albanese: East Syracuse Water Customers outside the village limits.**

“During 2003, the Onondaga County Health Department evaluated the wells at Leiter Brothers and South Springs for evidence of the presence of various micro organisms, algae and vascular plant debris, as required by the State Sanitary Code. The tests indicated that the sources are Ground Water under the Direct Influence of Surface Water (GWUDI). In a letter dated December 18, 2003, the Onondaga County Health Department has given the Village of East Syracuse until June 18, 2005 to either provide filtration or to locate another source of water. The Village is presently seeking other sources of water that will eliminate the current sources of water, as well as the customers currently served along the Village’s water lines.

Therefore, we are notifying you that your water service may be eliminated by June 18, 2005, and you will need to find another source of water. Currently, the Town of LaFayette is attempting to form a water district to keep properties in that Town with water...”

Supervisor Scammell said he is holding a meeting April 21<sup>st</sup> at the Jamesville-DeWitt Elementary School at 7:00 p.m. on this. This meeting will be with all the directly billed customers and the indirectly billed customers who get water from the directly billed customers and pay them for it.

**O. NYS DEC: New comment period for Onondaga Lake cleanup plan.**

“The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has concurred with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation’s (DEC’s) Preferred Remedy (Proposed Plan) for the remediation of the Onondaga Lake Bottom site. DEC has opened a new public comment period related to the Onondaga Lake Bottom Proposed Plan and has requested an extension of the date for DEC to issue its Record of Decision (ROD) or final plan for the remediation of the Onondaga Lake Bottom site....

Pursuant to terms of the Consent Decree entered in federal court, the ROD was to be issued by DEC on April 1, 2005. However, at EPA’s request, DEC has requested the court to extend the ROD date until July 1, 2005. This would allow time for the new public comment period. It would also afford DEC and EPA the opportunity to have further dialogue with the Onondaga Nation regarding the Proposed Plan...”

**P. Other.**

Councilor Knapp said Paul Puttkamer wondered if the Board wanted him to open and close the bathrooms at the park again this year. Does the Board want Shari Wheatley to clean them again?

Paul also requested signs be put up at the park advising park opens at sunrise and closes at sunset.

Leon Cook will check to see what signs are up now.

Mary Jo thinks he would like one by the pavilion too.

Supervisor Scammell said Paul has had some concerns about the dogs running loose down there.

Councilor Knapp wondered if there was a spot to put a sign up asking for people to respect others and control their pets.

The Board would like to increase Paul's areas to include checking on Stafford Park, Bailey Park, LaFayette Beach and the ballfields behind the Highway Dept.

**Councilor's Knapp moved and McConnell seconded the motion to appoint Paul Puttkamer to open and close the bathrooms at Stafford Park beginning April 18, 2005 through October 31, 2005 and to appoint Shari Wheatley to clean the bathrooms at the park during the same time-frame. Motion passed unanimously.**

The Board received a letter from the LaFayette High School Parents Group asking for a donation for the After-Prom Party for all Juniors and Seniors along with their guests.

**Councilor's McConnell moved and Knapp seconded the motion to donate \$250 to the After-Prom Party. Motion passed unanimously.**

**7. SPECIAL REPORT. Donna, Rural Development - USDA.**

Dona said she wanted to make us aware that there is funding available to low-income households. They do repair work on low-income homes. They give grants for the elderly. They can do water and sewer hookups. You do have to be under the income guidelines to qualify. These are loans that offer up to 20 years. A lot of people aren't aware of their program. If anyone's interested, she will leave some fliers and they can call her office. They also have loans for low-income families or household's to purchase homes. They are 33 year loans. They are subsidized mortgages. She asked Supervisor Scammell to give her a call with the addresses involved with the East Syracuse water problem and she will tell him if they are in the eligible area.

Charles Gabriel was present regarding 911 using our frequency.

Supervisor Scammell said the Board didn't really understand what the memo said.

Charles Gabriel said the bullets are designed to protect the Town of LaFayette.

Councilor Knapp said the main concern is that we would still have access to it. There was some mechanism in place that if we had to switch frequencies, we would be helped along the way.

Charles Gabriel said if you decided to become part of the proposed service, should the project get off the ground, they will handle all the coordination and technical side of the frequency. In the event the project doesn't get off the ground, nothing will

change. In the meantime, they will work with the town under a pilot. They would like to start the pilot program with the school buses.

Councilor Knapp said the topography of our town makes communication difficult and we don't want to put that in any kind of jeopardy.

Charles Gabriel said they would not want to omit anyone. Back in December all the heads of the fire departments in the county and city, etc. sent a letter to the County Executive's Office stating he hadn't done anything to address the communication problems of the city and county. They are our first responders. When you are dealing with a major situation, it's virtually impossible to patch people in like 911 does now. The county legislature agreed to undertake a study to see what could be done. They are asking to be allowed to see if the frequency the town currently uses could be part of the overall mix. They can't do anything with the FCC unless the town agrees to grant them permission.

Councilor McConnell asked what the mechanism for approval or disapproval is. Does he now apply to the FCC?

Charles Gabriel said they have sent the first batch of letters granting permission to the FCC. It will take about a year to do the complete frequency study. Fabius has already signed off on this. Once this thing gets rolling according to the memorandum of understanding, they must keep the town informed of what is going on.

Councilor Knapp asked if they find out that the frequency we are on now works for them, do we stay on it with them?

Charles Gabriel said you will stay on until 2007. If they find the Town of LaFayette can stay in the mix, they will then be brought into the network.

Councilor Knapp said the plan is to bring us into this.

Charles Gabriel said yes and if not, they will find a frequency for the town to go onto in place of the current one being used.

Councilor McConnell said if they use our frequency and give us a new one, what is the cost?

Charles Gabriel said you would have to incur those costs anyway. By the end of this year or the early part of next year, they will know whether they can use our frequency.

Councilor Knapp said if we are on the frequency with 911 it will give the school, fire dept., and highway dept. direct contact with 911.

Charles Gabriel said they haven't discussed the highway dept. yet. They have to take care of the first responders first. They would like to open it up down the road.

Kevin Gilligan said there is nothing in the agreement that says if we give this up, we will be part of the OCICS. Is there anything in the agreement that says we have a right to join it?

Charles Gabriel said they can't come out and say they are going to bring the town into it. They have to get the base system up yet. They would like to try to bring as many people into the mix as they can.

Councilor Knapp said his main concern is if we are not part of it, they will fix us up with something. If the school district is part of it and the highway dept. isn't, they will find a home for our highway dept.

Kevin Gilligan said where the agreement talks about the alternative frequency, it says "...should the Agency not participate in OCICS. Is this if the town doesn't want to or if the county doesn't have room for us?"

Charles Gabriel said it shouldn't be a question of room. It will be a matter of how to engineer it so you can be a part of it. They must get the protocol and rules set up.

Supervisor Scammell asked Kevin Gilligan if he has any concerns.

Kevin Gilligan said he just doesn't think everything that is being proposed here is in the agreement. He said the second bullet means Leon Cook will be able to do all his work whether the OCICS happens or not.

Charles Gabriel said correct.

Leon Cook said at their last Superintendent's Meeting, he mentioned that in order to make this project work they would be applying for a grant, if they don't get the grant would it hold everything up?

Charles Gabriel said there are a number of other sources for funding which he can look into.

Kevin Gilligan asked what kind of expenses might there be in switching to the OCICS system.

Charles Gabriel said he doesn't have any idea at this point in time. He said the town will have to face this issue eventually. This will be a 40-50 million dollar project by the time it's done.

**Councilor's McConnell moved and Knapp seconded the motion to authorize the Supervisor to sign the Memorandum of Understanding. Motion passed unanimously.**
